"Camille," that "rich and" true classic that never fails to move young and old alike with its inspiring romance and bitter tragedy, is once again a local entertainment feature. BIRKENHEAD, England (AP)—Fifty thousand Boy Scouts from all parts of the world will meet the prince of Wales here August 1 when he flies up from London to participate in their international jamboree.

The jamboree is scheduled to open July 31 in celebration of the twenty-first anniversary of the birth of scouting.

The prince will spend the night in camp with the scouts and the next day will witness a grand rally from the dais in front of the grandstand in Arrowe park.

In this international rally he will be greeted by boys from half a hundred countries. At a given signal the boys will raise the "Scouts' howl" and dash in camp formation toward the dais. At another signal they will come to a standstill in a semicircle round the prince and listen to what he has to say.

After which the prince will fly back to London and 50,000 boys will greet over the prospect of saying to their pals when they reach home again:

"What? The Prince of Wales? Sure, I know him!"
