LONDON, July 24 (AP)—Newspaper reports to the London Daily Mail today said the southwest coast of Iceland, experienced a severe earth shock yesterday afternoon.

The concrete buildings in the hospital swayed and tector stricken. Inhabitants abandoned all houses in a few seconds. The shock was most severe near Mount Hekla.

No casualties have been reported. Many of the island's residents spent last night out doors.

Exchange Telegraph company dispatches from Reykjavik said that city seemed not to have suffered much beyond cracked walls and tumbled chimneys.

Ben Lyon Has Role Of Quitter In New Colonial Feature

Embracing a variety of scenes, involving a number of unusual characters, embodying an intensely dramatic plot and thrilling situations "The Quitter," Columbia's new production at the Colonial Thursday and Friday, is one of the most entertaining pictures we have seen this season.

Featuring Ben Lyon, Dorothy Dreyer and Fred Kohler, it tells the story of a young surgeon who faints at the critical moment of an operation he is performing to save the life of his own mother who was injured in an automobile accident. His mother's life pays the forfeit for his weakness. The grateful, filled with self-reverence, as well, he goes out into the world and becomes a hopeless derelict.

Coming to a racing stable for work, he is able to save the life of a valuable racehorse. In gratitude the owner, who also conducts a cheap cafe, takes him to this rendezvous for gangsters. Here he meets Patricia, a cafe singer, and the owner's sweetheart.

Patricia becomes interested in the youth who seems so far above his present environment, yet proves so worthless and hopeless. The owner of the cafe is grateful at Patricia's interest in the boy and decides to do away with him in cold blood. Patricia shoots the cafe owner as he is about to murder the lad. The young surgeon in the belief that the girl he loves is the sweetheart of the cafe owner, determines to save the latter's life. He performs a risky operation—and succeeds. Then he learns that the girl really cares for him. This gives him an incentive for life and a desire to make good.

Great Part of "The Air Circus" Filmed By Cameras In Air

Pioneering in pictures is likely to be associated by most fans with something historical, but Howard Hawks and Lew Seiler found themselves pioneers when it came to making the Fox film "The Air Circus" current at the Star theater. Although Hawks had made six other notable productions for Fox Films, in this opus he was called upon to evolve something entirely new because fully 75 per cent of the picture was filmed in the air.

Other sky productions had preceded this, but those had had the resources of the army and others to draw upon, whereas the directors had to evolve their own equipment, widely differing from that used in ordinary studio work.

First, Fox Films leased a part of Clover Field at Santa Monica, Cal., and put up hangars, machine shops, darkrooms, restaurant and other adjuncts to a real flying field. Then they went to plane engineers and developed special camera mounts so that a camera could be placed in virtually any position on the plane from a wing strut to the rudder.

Directing in the air is no mean problem. The players, David Rollins, Sue Carol, Arthur Lake and Charles Delaney, were fully instructed before they left the ground. Much of the shooting was done by motion picture cameras, and the players themselves controlled the motors of the cameras.
