WHEA TFUTTERS ONCE AGAIN ON CHICAGO BOARD

CHICAGO, July 24 (AP)—Wheat advanced early on the Chicago market today, but met with increased selling, and gains were more than wiped out. Unlooked for upturns in Liverpool quotations together with high temperatures and continued drought northwest, were largely offset by news that United States government vessels would not furnish storage room for wheat, opening 3/4 to 2 1/4 c. higher, wheat afterward receded in some cases to well below yesterday's finish. Corn and oats sympathized with wheat, both starting 3/4 c. to 5/8 c. up, and then reacting. Provisions climbed. Wheat closed unsettled, 1/4 to 1/2 c. under yesterday's finish. Corn closed 1 to 1 1/2 c. down, oats 1/4 to 1 c. off, and provisions varying from 2 c. decline to a rise of 10c. Today's car receipts; wheat 100, flour 5, corn 16, oats 2, July 2.

Butter Prices On All Around Spurt, Egg Values Same

PORTLAND, Ore., July 24 (AP)—Butter prices took a spurt all around today. Extras and standards went up one cent and first half a cent. Butterfat advanced to 44c station and 45c track, with the Portland delivery price quoted at 47c. The advance is in keeping with the firm tone which has characterized the market for several days. Egg values were unchanged. First receipt of telephone peas from the coast area arrived today. They are 10 to 12 cents wholesale. Bananas were higher at 7 and 7 1/2.

The East Side market of the Gardeners' and Ranchers' association is having one of the busiest and most profitable summers in its history. Although produce is abundant, the members have little trouble in selling all they can bring in at profitable prices. Egg prices with the season at its full end, sold higher. Wednesday at 4 to 5 cents, French beans were down to 3; yellow butternut corn was lower at 55, while peaches declined to 8 cents. Stock Prices Are Irregular After Opening Strong

NEW YORK, July 24 (AP)—Marking up of the call money rate from 7 to 8 per cent turned the course of stock prices irregular today after an opening outburst of strength. Operations for the advance were not entirely abandoned, however, but were confined largely to the public utility, railroad and communications issues, several of which reached new high ground. The market encountered considerably selling in spots during the last hour, when call money was put up to 9 per cent. United States steel lost all of its gain and registered a fractional net loss. This elevator dropped 18 points and the air stocks were under pressure. Wright, Curtiss and United losing three or four points. American telephone continued strong, however, extending its gain to more than eight points. The close was irregular. Total sales approximated 3,900,000 shares.

ALL WORLD GRASPS HANDS

(Continued from Page 1) had deposited their instruments of ratification with the Washington government. All but one, that of Japan, have been in the archives of the state department for some time, and Secretary Stimson made special arrangements to complete this momentous file by receiving the Japanese ratification early in the day from the hands of Ambassador Deluoch. Only a few hours before the formal ceremonies the state department announced that five additional nations had completed their adherence to the pact and forwarded their instruments of ratification to Washington. The nations were Chile, Costa Rica, Haiti, Venezuela and Switzerland. President Hoover had prepared a brief address to proclaim the treaty in force and binding. In common with other high officials of the administration, he believes the pact has already braved its value by the way in which it served as a restraining influence when Russia and China, less than a week ago, broke off diplomatic relations and appeared to be on the verge of warfare in Manchuria. Furthermore, in outlining his general program for reducing military expenditures, he declared only yesterday that the international situation had been "greatly modified" by the treaty and that the present held less threat of war than any period within the last 50 years.

WASHINGTON, July 24 (AP)—By its own terms the Kellogg-Briand treaty for renunciation of war as an instrument of national policy became effective at noon today with the deposit by Japan at the state department of its formal instrument of adherence. The document of ratification personally was presented by Ambassador Deluoch of Japan and with this action the treaty became binding upon the 46 nations which have expressed adherence to its terms.

WASHINGTON, July 24 (AP)—President Hoover today proclaimed effective the Kellogg treaty for the renunciation of war and congratulated "the entire world" upon this additional instrument of peace endeavor "for the sake of humanity." Ceremonies of imposing solemnity attended the promulgation of the pact. Gathered in the historic east room of the white house were former President Coolidge, former Secretary of State Frank B. Kellogg, and the diplomatic representatives of all but two of the nations that have become parties to the treaty. Delivering a short address, Mr. Hoover asked the diplomats to convey to their governments the appreciation of the United States that "through their cordial collaboration an act so auspicious for the future happiness of mankind had been brought to its consummation."

"I dare predict," he said, "that the influence of the treaty for the renunciation of war will be felt in a large proportion of all future international acts. The magnificent opportunity and the compelling duty now open to us should spur us on to the fulfillment of every opportunity that is calculated to implement this treaty and to

extend the policy which it so nobly sets forth." WASHINGTON, July 24 (AP)—Calvin Coolidge alighted from a train at 7:05 o'clock this morning for his first visit to the capital since March 4. Mr. Coolidge came to Washington to attend ceremonies in connection with the promulgation of the Kellogg pact.

MacDonald said the British naval construction program of 1920-21 would further be considered before any more commitments are entered.

LONDON, July 24 (AP)—Firstlord of the admiralty Alexander Henderson in the house of commons today, a statement of Sir Austen Chamberlain on Feb. 3, 1920, that "preparation for war with the United States has never been and never will be a basis of our policy in any case." The statement of the first lord in reply to a question whether it was the labor government's intention to rule out entirely the United States as a possible enemy.

TOKYO, July 24 (AP)—Official permission was granted today by the Japanese government to Lieutenant Harold Bromley, American aviator who plans a Tacoma-Tokyo flight, to fly over Japan and land at Tachikawa air field, 25 miles west of Tokyo.
