Synod Splendid One, Says The Rev. Walz

Rev. J. George Walz, returned Tuesday morning from the meeting of the Synod of Oregon of the Presbyterian church, held at Albany College, Albany. He reports one of the best attended and most enthusiastic sessions held for some years. Representatives from every Presbytery in the state were present.

Rev. A. W. Lewis of the First Church, Bend, was selected Moderator, Thomas W. Bibb, D. D., recently appointed president of Albany College, was introduced and presented the report of the work of the college. The boys' dormitory has been completed, a new gymnasium will be built, ground to be broken before the opening of the school year. He reported the receipt of \$100,000 for the endowment fund, and other funds aggregating about \$50,000, to be used for new buildings. The college will continue to offer opportunity for self-support students. About 60 per cent of the students of last year were self-support students.

Dr. Clelland B. McAfee of Chicago, moderator of the general assembly conducted a series of Bible study periods.

The committee on Christian education, Rev. Walz, chairman, consumed four hours to present their report which covered the Westminster foundation which supports the student pastors at Eugene and Corvallis; young peoples' conferences, moral reform, etc.

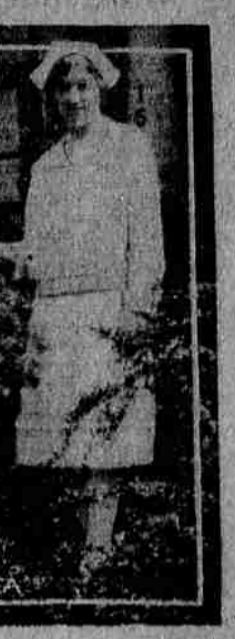
