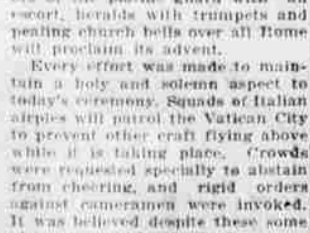

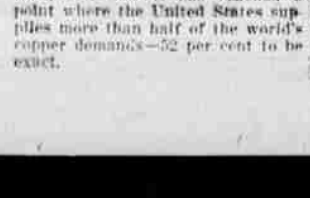

Sonnenberg Retains World Championship

LOS ANGELES, July 25, (AP)—Gridiron tactics which won for him the world's heavyweight wrestling championship, enabled Gus Sonnenberg to retain that title today, the result of two straight falls over Joe Malcoewicz of Utica, N. Y., before 10,000 fans last night. A terrific body slam, which climaxed 42 minutes 22 seconds of rough and ready grappling paved the way for victory for the former Dartmouth football star. The second and deciding fall followed after 11 minutes 42 seconds of wrestling. The Utica panther found himself no match for the college boy, who alternated his flying tackle and headlocks with tiling effect, wearing Malcoewicz down to the point of submission. Both falls resulted directly from the terrific tackles made by Sonnenberg, followed by body slams. The Olympic auditorium was packed, with paid admissions amounting to more than \$30,000.

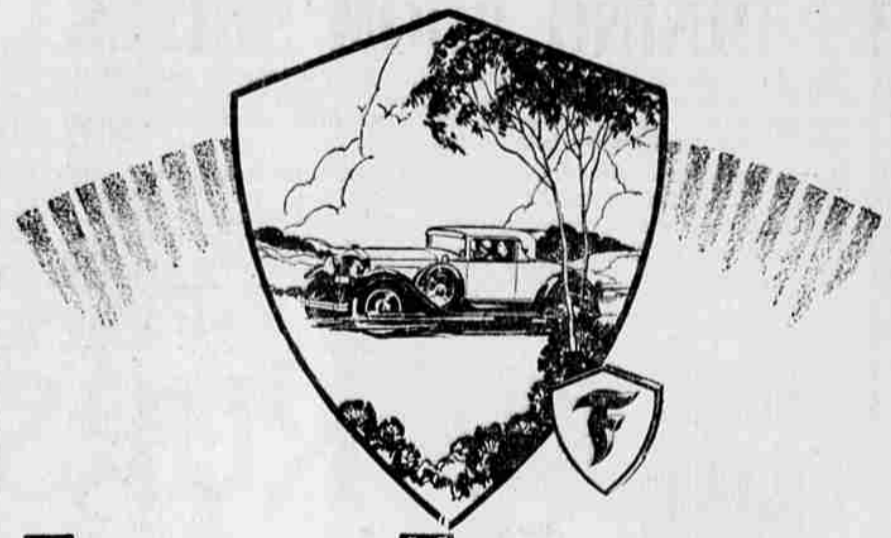
