Prizes For Fish Feed Are Listed By Roy Farnum

With the sage suggestion, "Here is a chance to prove that last told fish story," Roy Farnum, president of the Frank Walton League, this morning announced the various entries for the fish feed contest, July 29th.

There will be five graded prizes for the largest individual catch of not over 30 fish; first, second, and third for the largest rainbow; first, second and third for the largest Eastern Brook; first, second and third for the largest daffy dander; and first, second and third for the largest two-party catch, for the largest three-party catch, and for the largest four-party catch. Then, there are to be awards for the longest trip and the biggest fish story.

"There's no question but that every true fisherman will go out and bring in that prize catch," declared Mr. Farnum this morning. Arrangements have been made at Herman's lunch to place any fish turned in on cold storage so that they will be just as fresh as when caught for the feed Monday. Any fish will be taken care of night or day at Herman's.

"We expect to make this one of the largest events ever staged for sportsmen of Union county," added Mr. Farnum.

It is not necessary to be a member of the Frank Walton League to participate in this event, he explained, adding "but after a man realizes what the league has accomplished in other states he wouldn't mind it."

Release Pheasants

Mr. Farnum announced that another load of Chinese Pheasants has been released in the valley near Elletts. Mr. Carney, deputy game warden, handled the distribution of the birds.

Prices at the East Side market of the Gardeners' and Ranchers' association were also without change. An immense amount of produce was brought in, but heavy buying kept the prices firm.

PORTLAND, July 25 (AP)—More than 15 airplanes are expected to take off from the Port of Portland airport tomorrow in two air races to Eugene where an air carnival is to be staged as a part of the Sunset Trail pioneer celebration.

M. F. Wright, secretary of the Aero club, said today he had listed no definite entries, although it is believed that many local and outside aviators will compete.

Tex Rankin will probably fly one of his new training planes in the first race, open to planes powered with motors of 110-horsepower or less. This event will start at noon.

The second race, to start at 12:30 p. m., will be open to 175-horsepower planes or ships powered with motors rated at better than 150-horsepower.

REACTIONARY TENDENCIES ON STREET

NEW YORK, July 25 (AP)—Pronounced reactionary tendencies developed again in today's stock market although a sprinkling of issues continued to show independent strength. Selling embraced a wide variety of stocks, including several of the recently popular rails and public utilities, with net declines ranging from 1 to 10 points.

Many of the early losses were recovered in the late afternoon, as the motors led a rally. General Motors, Chrysler and Packard rose 1 1/2 to nearly 3 and Marmon more than 7 points. North American sealed a new peak above 174; United States steel regained all its early loss. United States Steel broke 3, National Biscuit 3 and Commercial Investment Trust 4 1/2. The closing was irregular. Sales approximated 3,000,000.

JOE DUNDEE AND JACK FIELDS SET FOR MIX TONITE

DETROIT, July 25 (AP)—With a gate of more than \$100,000 assured for the first 15 round championship fight in Michigan under the new boxing law, Floyd Fitzsimmons' chief worry today was the weather which threatened to dampen the order of 22,000 fight fans who purchased tickets for the Joe Dundee-Jackie Fields welterweight championship battle at the Michigan state fair grounds tonight. Dundee the Italian cham-

pio from Baltimore, has not shown any considerable fighting ability since he gained the title two years ago, and consequently will enter the ring tonight strongly suspected of being about to lose his crown. Fields, who has five years younger ring experience, has come on rapidly and has plenty of betting support. Fields' supporters expect him to knock out the champion. Dundee has been down several times, but never out.

Floyd (Tony) McMillan, Detroit referee, will be the third man in the ring.

Handful of both fighters have announced that their boys are in

perfect condition and would offer no allies regardless of the outcome. Fields indicated that he did not intend to let the prestige of the champion impress him. "I mean to come out of the ring the new welterweight champion," he declared. "I'm going to box and punch Dundee off his feet."

Dundee also expressed confidence as to the outcome of the fight. "I am in the best shape I have been in years," he asserted. "I hope to make my best fight by defeating my title against Fields."
