## AVIATORS STAY IN AIR AS 320 MARK IS REACHED

(Continued from Page 1) City, especially after the exchange of telegrams yesterday. The Robin had a 100-hour lead on the Texas plane, but "Red" and "Obie" expressed the idea of staying up until the Billion Dollar City faltered and descended.

There was \$1500 in the jackpot being received by the chamber of commerce last night for the fliers in addition to the \$2673 they are earning for each 24-hour period aloft.

The 500-hour achievement is not a mantle in the opinion of two motor experts. Arthur Nutt, designer of the motor, and Stuart K. Prince, who installed it in the Robin, Nutt's faith was founded on test bench operation in the throes of 500 hours with the throttle wide open while Prince "would not be surprised if it stays up 500 hours more. The valves probably will be the first thing to cease functioning. But it might be some little thing that no one ever gave a thought to which will finally force it down."
