### Tone of Wool Mart Better, Report To Relate Tomorrow

BOSTON, July 26 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow: "Wool markets have shown a small measure of recovery and the tone of the entire wool market on this side of the Atlantic is distinctly better. Prices are fully firm for all descriptions on last week's basis of prices and possibly a bit dearer on the less attractive fine wools. Medium wools are strong. Manufacturers evidently are getting a fair business and topmakers have been free buyers for about ten days. Many think the bottom has been reached at length. London closed a drab series Tuesday, with prices more stable at the end, due chiefly no doubt to heavy withdrawals, amounting to 42 per cent for the series. East India sales have been barely firm. In the west movement from the growers has been chiefly on reassignment and there is nothing especially new. Mohair is dull but not notably changed."

The Commercial Bulletin will publish the following wool quotations tomorrow: Scoured basis; Oregon: Fine and f. m. staple 30-32; fine and f. m. P. combing.

**PORTLAND PRODUCE**  
PORTLAND, Ore., July 26 (AP)—Eggs, butter, poultry and fresh meats were steady and unchanged today. Tomatoes were scarce and high at \$2.50. The local crop has not yet begun to move in any appreciable quantities. This apricot season was fast reaching the peak of its canning period. A big movement of the fruit is expected over Sunday and Monday or Tuesday should see the fruit at its best for canning purposes. Shippers have held off in order to let the fruit ripen on the trees instead of in storage. Pending receipt of crops from more northern sections, the cantaloupe market is at a standstill, with prices high and the product scarce. The best were quoted at \$4.75 to \$5 a crate today. With the exception of French beans, which were down to 7 cents, prices on the east side market of the gardeners and ranchers association were on a level with those quoted Thursday. The surprise of the market is the steadiness with which berries have kept their values. With the raspberries and blackberries falling out, quotations are still around \$2 to \$2.25 for raspberries, and \$2 for the blackberries. The raspberry demand had maintained the prices. PORTLAND, Ore., July 26 (AP)—Butter, eggs, milk, poultry, onions, potatoes, wool, nuts, hay, cowboys bark and hops steady and unchanged.

**REYNOLDS AFFAIRS AGAIN**  
LONDON, July 26 (AP)—Richard Joshua Reynolds, wealthy, 25-year-old American, again appeared at Old Bailey today to face a new trial on a charge of manslaughter growing out of the death of Arthur Graham in an automobile accident May 14. Reynolds' first trial abruptly ended yesterday when the justice presiding dismissed the jury after learning that the foreman had been seen talking to witnesses. A retrial was ordered to begin today. A fresh jury was sworn in before Justice Humphrey and the case again got under way.
