Many Prices On Decline Due To End of The Week

PORTLAND, Ore., July 27 (AP)—Prices of many products declined at the Union avenue market of the Grocers' and Ranchers' association today. Desire to clean up stocks before the weekend accounted for the decline.

Trading was slower than Friday, when regular buyers plentifully to empty their Saturday trade.

Beans dropped to 6 cents; French beans to 6 and 7; Kentucky waltzers to 9 and 10; corn to \$3 for a sack of six dozen ears; raspberries to \$1.75 and \$2; blackberries to \$1.75; logans to \$1.40; peaches to 50 cents.

This was the first time this season that weakness was shown by the berries.

A load of ever-bearing strawberries made their appearance at \$2.50 to \$2.75.

Other prices were: potatoes 3; squash 75; cucumbers 85; tomatoes \$2.50; turnips 45; carrots, beets and onions 25; radishes 20; lettuce \$1; celery 90; peaches \$1.10 to \$1.25; green peppers \$1.50 a box.

Roseburg Prunes Sold To California Packing Company

ROSEBURG, Ore., July 27 (AP)—Sale of the entire Italian prune pool formed by the Douglas County Prune Growers' Cooperative association to the California Packing corporation was completed here today. The company took an only 250 tons but the pool amounted to 1,225,000 pounds.

A. G. Sutherland, local representative, was given authority, however, to purchase the entire pool at the bid price, based on 8 1/2 cents for 30-35's.

The directors of the cooperative instructed the secretary to send letters to members asking whether the growers favor another pool to clean up the crop immediately, or prefer to hold the rest of their prunes for later market development. If enough of the growers signify a desire to sell, another pool will be made up within the next few days.

Rain In Canada Bring Wheat Down

CHICAGO, July 27 (AP)—With rains reported in Canada and chances of more, wheat prices turned downward today after an early advance. Initial gains were on account of a temporary outburst of buying, largely the result of Liverpool quotations higher than due. Opening 1/2 to 1 1/2 up, Chicago wheat later fluctuated rapidly on a general downhill course. Corn, oats and provisions were relatively firm, with corn starting unchanged to 1c higher and subsequently holding near to the opening limits.

Corn closed buoyant, 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 cents above yesterday's finish. Wheat closed firm, 1 1/2 to 1 1/2 up. Oats 3/4 to 1 1/2 advanced. Provisions unchanged to 1c down.

Rogers-Carroll Star In "Close Harmony" Arcade

The closing figures for wheat were \$1.12 for July, \$1.17 1/2 for September, \$1.18 1/2 to \$1.25 for December and \$1.00 for March. Corn finished at \$1.03 1/2 for July, Sept. \$1.06 1/2, Dec. \$1.09 1/2 to \$1 and Mar. \$1.04.
