## BROMLEY SAYS HE WON'T START BEFORE MONDAY MORNING

(Continued from Page 1) Airport enclosure which leads directly to the run way, and indications were that later in the day all people as well would be ordered behind the barbed wire fence at the end of the field. Work of fueling the plane will begin early this afternoon, it is understood and the plane will be entirely gassed and oiled, except for "topping" the last "top" of 100 gallons or more of gasoline, which will fill the tanks to the very brim, will be done just before the takeoff. The double guard around the plane and ordering back the crowd was done to protect the plane against fire from matches and cigarettes, particularly during fueling and oiling, and to facilitate the fueling when it starts, it was explained. ## FARM BOARD PLANS CO-OP CORPORATION

(Continued from Page 1) Carl Williams of Oklahoma City, official spokesman for the board, said today. He explained that while grain producers will receive more for their product under the board's plan, the prices in world markets will be unaffected, marketing economies made possible under the proposed arrangement accounting for the difference. The board resumed its session, which opened yesterday, with more than 50 representatives of grain marketing interests from all over the west in attendance. Today's session was behind closed doors, as was yesterday's.

"What the farm board wants is a merger of all grain marketing co-operative bodies for the common good of agriculture," Mr. Williams said. "The board cannot help the individual farmer, but it can enable farmers banded together in groups to help themselves. Even farmers who are not members of co-operative organizations will derive benefit from the operation of the board through the stabilization of prices. Statistics show that two million out of approximately six million farmers in the United States are members of co-operative associations. "The board intends to influence the flow of commodities to market, to stabilize prices, to increase efficiency, to minimize prices, to prevent undue fluctuation, to increase efficiency, to minimize waste, and to seek to increase the net return to the producer without a corresponding increase in price to the consumer."

STETTIN, Germany, July 27. —An undetermined number of market women were drowned less than 50 feet from dock in an unexplained disaster to a small cargo boat today. The boat, carrying 39 women and a cargo of vegetables, shoved off, but began suddenly to sink. Within four minutes it filled and capsized. Some were saved by jumping into other boats. Two dead and two seriously injured were picked up. Divers were sent down in search of other bodies.

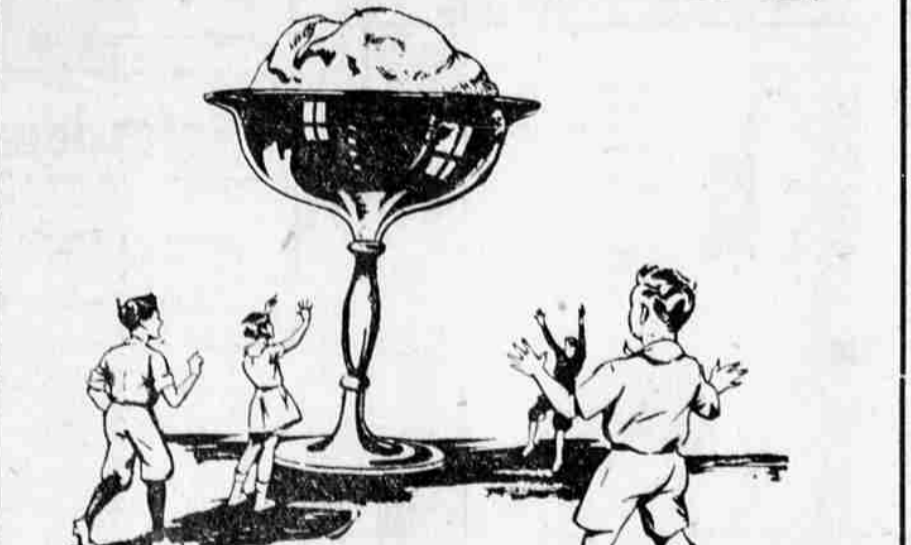
