Seven in Airship Have Close Escape
DENVER, July 29 (AP)—Seven passengers and the pilot of the United States Air Lines plane that was to make the inaugural flight between Denver and Kansas City on a regular passenger schedule, narrowly escaped death today when the ship collapsed in taking off. The big ship, an all metal plane, was piloted by H. G. Sweet.
