## ROGUE PEARS GO FOR \$80 A TON IN GRANTS PASS

**GRANTS PASS, Ore., July 29 (AP)**—With a fifty per cent fruit yield in view, Rogue River valley pear growers are selling their crops at a price of approximately \$80 a ton to buyers who are awaiting over this territory closing contracts. Buyers report the valley fruit in excellent condition for canning purposes and within a few days the movement is expected to attain top speed.

One Grants Pass box factory has contracts in sight for two million crates using six million feet of lumber. One contract alone calls for delivery by August 29 of 23 cartons or 45,000 pear boxes for the movement of Rogue Valley pears.

Large contracts have been placed here by California growers.

## Give Museum To U. S. Memorial

**ANDERSON, CAL. (AP)**—A museum has been presented to the United States in memory of a California girl.

It is in the Lassen Volcanic National park and is the gift of B. P. Loomis and Anderson as a memorial to his daughter, Mae. The gift also includes 40 acres of land and a semimasonry building made of all varieties of lava.

The museum is constructed of softly tinted native stone and reinforced concrete. The only wood is in the window frames and the bronze covered door. The main building is devoted chiefly to volcanic exhibits including a photographic history of Lassen peak and its recent eruptions.

The semimasonry was installed by the geological survey of the department of the interior.
