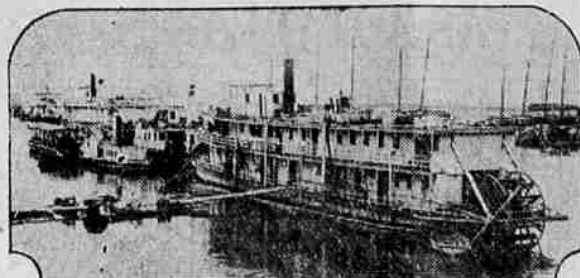
Here From Ontario—
