Says Work Needed On The Farm Plan

BATON ROUGE, La., July 31—(AP)—C. C. Teague, federal farm board member, today told the American institute of cooperation there was need for more intensive work toward the farm cooperative movement by federal and state extension agents.

There are about 4,000 extension agents and specialists in the extension system of the federal and state government and while they have aided materially in teaching the farmer how to produce more efficiently, Mr. Teague said, they have given little attention to the more important question of marketing.

Mt. Emily Is Best For Scenic View In Entire Nation

Pike's Peak, Mt. Washburn in Yellowstone and top points of the Cumberland mountains can't begin to compare with Mt. Emily when it comes to the scenic view, declares a western Oregon couple, just home from a trans-continental tour. They had some complimentary things to say about the Grande Ronde valley peak in an Oregonian column yesterday. The story follows.

"In an auto trip of 1000 miles, through ten states, the best planned and the best maintained roads I found were in Oregon," says A. W. Fessenden of Seaside after driving here from Mobile, Ala. "We drove up through the Rocky mountains from New Mexico to the Yellowstone, taking in all the lofty peaks that were accessible, and the most magnificent view we had was from the top of Mount Emily, about 12 miles from La Grande. In fact, we consider it the most impressive view we have ever had anywhere, and we have toured the White mountains in New Hampshire, the Adirondacks and the Catskills. We have looked down on the Cumberland valley in Pennsylvania from High Rock back of Pen Mar; stood upon the crest of Stonyman mountain above the Shenandoah; viewed the Tennessee from the top of Lookout mountain and climbed both Pike's Peak in Colorado, and Mount Washburn in Yellowstone park. But there is not one of these scenic attractions that seem to us to compare with the view of the Grande Ronde valley from Mount Emily. Unfortunately, it is reached only by a narrow, unimproved, steep road, without any guide posts. The time will come when nearly all of the tourists who come down the Columbia will make the side trip to the top of Mount Emily and none of them will express regrets."
