Spring grain, although not yet ready for harvest, does not show as promising a yield as that planted last fall. Most of the first cutting of alfalfa and wild hay is harvested, but to the late season the second cutting of alfalfa is yet to be cured for.

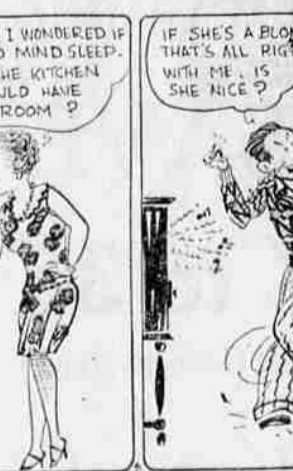
