**Resting Comfortably**— Dick Brothers, of Cove, who was seriously injured when the cherry truck he was driving turned over on the Cove-La Grande highway Tuesday night, is reported to be resting as comfortably as possible today. The account of the accident yesterday should have stated that Brothers is at the Grande Ronde hospital. He sustained a fracture of shoulder, broken bones in the lower jaw in two places, and a deep gash in the left side of the neck. The eye lid of his left eye was nearly closed and the right ear was nearly torn off.

## THREE MEN SLAIN BY INSANE CLERK

Spartanburg, S. C., in Uproar Before Maniac is Overpowered.

SPARTANBURG, S. C., Aug. 1 (AP)—Three men were killed, two others probably fatally wounded and the entire west end of the city thrown into confusion here today when T. Earl Robertson, a shipping clerk, becoming suddenly insane, ran amuck with a hand axe.

R. H. Day, 30, sales manager for the J. W. Bell company, J. L. Bussey, 58, bookkeeper and cashier for the same company, and M. L. Davis, a railroad employe, were instantly killed or so badly hurt that they died in a few minutes. That Sherbert, 31, a railroad employe and Dan Dunlap, negro, 40, an employe of the Bell company, are expected to die.

Robertson apparently was normal when he went to work this morning but became irrational toward noon. He crept up behind Day and Bussey in the office of the J. W. Bell company where all three were employed, killing them instantly with blows from the axe.

Leaving the building, Robertson went into the Charleston and Western Carolina railroad yards. There he saw Davis and Sherbert sitting in a box car eating their lunch. Coming up behind them he attacked the men before they were aware of his presence.

Davis died in a hospital an hour later. His head was crushed by a blow from the axe.

Sherbert this afternoon was unconscious in the same hospital.

## Held In Shooting

Physicians said he had no chance to recover.
