

### Wallowa County Herd Association Has July Report

WALLOWA, Ore., (Special)—The report of the Wallowa county Herd Improvement Association for July as compiled by Lewis C. Brandt, tester, is as follows: 592 cows were tested, of which 60 were dry. The total average for all cows tested was 640 lbs. of milk and 20.53 lbs. of butterfat. 154 cows produced more than 40 lbs. of fat during the month and 33 herds were on test. K. Hunter had high herd for the month with a herd of 60 registered Jerseys which produced an average of 828 lbs. of milk and 47.4 lbs. of butterfat. For herds of over 20 cows, including dry cows, Wood and Hand had high with their herd of 37 grade Guernseys and Jerseys averaging 748 lbs. of milk and 55.3 lbs. of fat.

For herds of from 12 to 20 cows, Orval Thorburn's herd of 16 grade Jerseys was high, the cows producing an average of 725 lbs. of milk and 36.1 lbs. of fat. Harley Murray has the high herd of the year to date. His grade Jerseys have produced an average of 752.3 lbs. of milk and 37.5 lbs. of butterfat in 11 months. He has an average of 8.9 cows in the herd at that time.

The high cow for July was Nig, a grade Holstein 8 years old and owned by Orval Thorburn which gave 1839 lbs. of milk and 38.2 lbs. of fat. Wood and Handland had the second high cow, Mary, who produced 1317 lbs. of milk containing 35.1 lbs. of fat. Mary is a grade Jersey.

During the month 14 cows were culled.

A meeting of the Wallowa County Herd Improvement association was held at the county house at Enterprise Monday evening for the purpose of reorganizing for another year. The present testing year ends Sept. 1 and it is necessary to sign up enough members by that time to continue the testing without delay. The month of August will complete the second year's work of the testing association and all those present at the meeting seemed to think that the results obtained thus far were very gratifying.

Sweden Solves Unemployment

STOCKHOLM (AP)—From 1914 to 1924 Sweden spent \$24,100,000 for relief of unemployed.

At present the number of unemployed in Sweden shows a minimum figure, but the number registered during 1922 averaged about 150,000 every month. Only about one-fifth of the entire sum spent was given as doles, the rest being used on constructive unemployment relief.

The works included the repairing of roads, building new roads and railroads of a total length of more than 1,800 miles, farm improvement and the building of 54 recreation grounds.

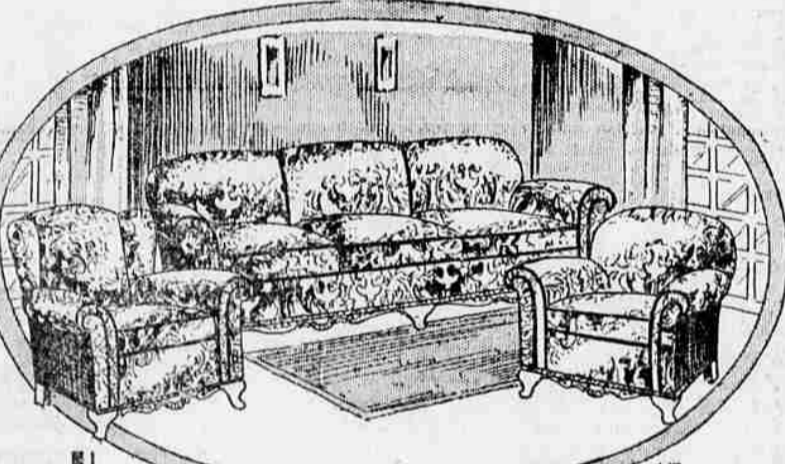
