There are some compensations for the hot days of mid-summer in the delicious fruits ripened by the burning sun. Pears of some variety are in the market almost the year round but the excellent Bartlett pear is at its best during August and September. There are many other high-quality varieties which follow the Bartlett, prolonging the season into the late fall.

In spite of their seeming sweetness, pears are somewhat acid and are an excellent tonic fruit. Their flavor is refreshing, tending to tone up a tired summer appetite. Eaten fresh in salads, fruit cups or desserts or as a breakfast fruit they make a welcome change.

How To Choose Pears

Pears are one of the few fruits which are best picked green and allowed to ripen in storage. This fruit develops better flavor and firmer texture than tree ripened fruit. In choosing pears those on the verge of greenness rather than ripeness are desirable.

Baked pears are prepared like baked apples and are very good with honey and eggs for breakfast. Jellied pears make an attractive

summer dessert which is simple to prepare.

Pears in chocolate sauce is a more elaborate dessert suitable for chilly days in early fall.

Stuffed pear salad is always popular and when fresh perfectly ripe fruit is used the salad is particularly good. Cream cheese mixed with preserved ginger and finely chopped nuts is an appetizing combination.

Jellied Pears

Four large pears, 1 cup sugar, 2 cups water, 1 lemon, 6 whole cloves, 1 inch stick cinnamon, 1 tablespoon granulated gelatine, 2 tablespoons cold water.

— Pare pears and cut in halves. Remove cores. Put sugar and water in sauce pan with cloves and cinnamon. Bring to the boiling point and add pears. Simmer until fruit is tender, adding water to keep about 2 cups of liquid. Remove cloves and cinnamon. Put pears in a mold and add softened gelatin to boiling juice. Stir until gelatine is dissolved and when cool add juice of lemon. Pour over pears and let stand on ice until chilled and firm. Serve with or without a garnish of whipped cream.
