

Union Teachers Are Elected For Coming Season

But it was the unusual privilege of members of the Methodist Episcopal church congregation to bid a double farewell to two missionaries about to return to China this morning at a breakfast party that took place at Pine Cone.

They were Dr. Ida Belle Lewis, nationally known for her work at Hwa Nan college in Foochow, China, as president of the Methodist school there, and Geneva Sayre, daughter of Superintendent and Mrs. E. A. Sayre, whose work is well known here. She is going to Kaifeng, China.

The event had been arranged to honor Dr. Lewis and it had not been known at first that the two might meet here. It was a peculiar pleasure for them to experience their first meeting this morning and that pleasure was increased when they discovered that they talked the same Chinese language. They parted, at the close of the breakfast, with the hope that they might renew their acquaintance one day in the Chinese mission fields.

Miss Mabel Morton was in charge of the breakfast which was given by the Ida Belle Lewis circle with about 75 attending. Miss Blanche Clark assisted her. During an informal few minutes of speaking Dr. Lewis was presented with eight dollars from the high school girls' class of the church for crayon money at the school. Then, Mrs. Fay Miller presented the missionary leader with fifty dollars given to her personally to dispense as she sees fit. She thanked the donors in a gracious talk, expressing her sincere appreciation in knowing that the "La Granderers were back of her."

At the parting when Dr. Lewis, accompanied by Miss Mabel Morton and little Miss Charabelle Seeman, of Seattle, Dr. Lewis' niece who has been here for some time with Miss Morton, left by car for Seattle, the church members sang "God Be With You Till We Meet Again," lead by W. W. Nusbaum.
