

**GENERAL MOTORS
DEALER SALES UP**

Amount to 200,754, Compared With 186,160 During June, 1928.

DETROIT, Aug. 2.—During the month of June General Motors dealers delivered to consumers 200,754 cars, according to an announcement by Alfred P. Sloan Jr., president. This compares with 186,160 for the corresponding month last year. The following tabulation shows monthly sales of General Motors cars by dealers to ultimate consumers and sales by the manufacturing divisions of General Motors to their dealers:

**De Soto Sixes
Break Records
Over The World**

DETROIT, Aug. 2.—The story of how speed and endurance records are being broken by De Soto Sixes throughout the world is being told in letters from drivers and owners to officials of the De Soto Motor Corporation at Detroit.

During the past few months many letters have been received, and press clippings as well, not only from America but from many foreign countries, praising De Soto dependability and stamina—through city traffic, over country highways and on the speedways.

In a 100-mile "free-for-all" stock car race June 9 over the dirt oval at Wichita, Falls, Texas, a De Soto roadster, owned by Walter E. Routt, of Houston, won first place in a long line of entries. B. D. Williams, who drove for Routt, kept his machine in sixth place until the 19th lap. Then with a sudden

burst of speed, the De Soto forged ahead and by the time the 19th lap was reached, he was in first place. Three laps later, at the end of the race, he was 399 yards in front. The time for the 100 miles was 2 hours, 5 minutes and 12 seconds—five minutes faster than the record made in 1928. The same car won first place and set a new record for the Bellare track at Houston in a 15-mile wheel, covered the distance in race, May 7. Williams, again at 13 minutes, 45 seconds—1.5 second faster than the time for the winner of a race for cars in the "more-than-\$1,000" class run the same day. Five days later, this roadster set a new record for stock models on a dirt track. During the time trial, the De Soto finished the 1 1/2 miles in 1 minute and 13 seconds, faster than the previous record by two seconds.

**FIFTY MILLIONS
SPENT ON ROADS**

**New England States
Adopt Ambitious High-
way Building Program.**

BOSTON (AP)—New England will spend approximately \$20,000,000 on surfaced roads during 1929, figures gathered from the several states by the New England Council reveal.

In Maine \$4,500,000 will be expended, including federal aid money. New Hampshire expects that expenditures for building or maintaining surfaced roads will agree-

gate more than \$7,600,000. Expenditures for similar purposes in Vermont are expected to reach \$4,200,000.

Massachusetts will expend, including all forms of construction and maintenance, about \$15,000,000. In Rhode Island about \$1,500,000 will be used for surfaced highways. Connecticut has a program that will call for the expenditure of \$11,000,000 for construction and repair.

A total of 658 miles of new hard surfaced roads are to be constructed in New England this year. Many more miles of highways will be reconstructed or resurfaced.
