Health Talks

By WILLIAM D. REID, M. D., Boston University, School of Medicine, Boston, Massachusetts. Heart disease is not a single condition with varying degrees of severity. On the contrary, the heart is liable to a number of diseases, which differ in their causation and in their effect upon the organ. The matter of prevention may perhaps be clearer if presented from the standpoint of the causation, as far as this is known. Infectious disease of the cardiac valves, preferably rheumatic rheumatic heart disease, is usually due to the same infection that causes rheumatic fever, chorea, and tonsillitis. There is much evidence that one of the streptococcal group of organisms is the causative agent. Bacterial heart disease is similar but more rapidly fatal. Any one of a number of microorganisms may be found in varying degrees of concentration in infected wounds, pus-filled abscess, pneumonia, gonorrhoea, empyema, infected teeth, etc., usually precede the onset of bacterial heart disease. Syphilis often invades the heart and large blood vessels. It makes and kills these in the prime of life. The prevention of these infectious forms of heart disease, in various forms, the prevention of the large group of infections. It is believed helpful to eradicate all foci of infection such as infected teeth, etc. The campaign against venereal disease should be vigorously supported, and if syphilis is acquired, adequate treatment over a prolonged period should be taken. Toxic, dysentery and hyperthyroidism induce cardiac disease apparently due to the effect of toxins. Diphtheria can be cured by the prompt use of antitoxin, and entirely prevented by the use of the toxin-antitoxin injections. In the administration of iodine and resort to surgery on the thyroid gland, hypothyroidism can be cured in time to spare the heart permanent damage. Degenerative heart disease, of old age cannot be prevented, as the fact of growing old appears to be unavoidable. The practice of good hygiene as regards regular exercise, a healthful diet and plenty of fresh air and sunlight may assist materially in preventing the too early onset of the degenerative changes of senescence. A less well understood heart disease, associated with chronic high blood pressure, is apparently the chief cause of the rise in the mortality from heart disease that has taken place in recent years. The actual cause is as yet unknown. The evidence is strong that a poorly chosen diet, obesity, and lack of exercise are significant factors in its causation. Congenital heart disease, or imperfect formation of the heart, is probably caused by the same factors as those leading to reduced fertility and sterility of the parent.

WICHITA, Kas. (AP)—Jimmy Creson, 16, is the fame and fortune boy of Kansas oil fields. A promising oil play has begun on his five acres of land near Wichita, and Jimmy already has \$10,000 in his pocket and an overriding royalty on "No. 1 Creson." It all happened because Jimmy struck with his dad. When his parents separated years ago, the boy stayed with his father while the other children followed their mother to Oregon. When the older Creson died, this five-acre plot was left to Jimmy.

It should be evident from the above that it is not always possible for the individual to avoid disease of the heart. There is, however, much value in the habit of obtaining a general medical examination each year. At such times signs and symptoms may be detected early, and the treatment instituted may prevent impairment of the heart or check the disease before serious damage has occurred.
