control chief for Oregon and Washington. Forty two fires in the Wenatchee forest were reported under control last night. A blaze started Saturday near Wilbur, was believed to be near control after having burned 500 acres.

FEW BLAZES IN OREGON
PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 6. (AP)—Small, scattered brush fires in the Douglas firs were the only forest blazes reported in Oregon by the government forestry service here today. The fires, usually confined to an acre or so, were being controlled as fast as they broke out.

Six new fires were reported today in the Chehalis national forest in northeast Washington, the foresters said. None of the blazes was believed serious.

400 FIRES REPORTED
WASHINGTON, Aug. 6. (AP)—The United States forest service today received a report from its district headquarters at Portland, Oregon, that lightning had set 400 fires in the northern Cascade and Blue mountains during the first five days of August.

These fires, the report said, are now under control everywhere but in the Chehalis and Itainier forests.
