PARIS (AP)—A new cape-collared, called a collarette, shaped like the ace of spades with a hole cut in the middle, is the newcomer in neckwear.

It opens up a whole new vista of collar possibilities. Wise ones think the collarette has come for a long stay in one form or another.

Its present form is usually "pouf to sport," with printed designs of polka dots or incriminated or printed graduated bands of contrasting or blending shades.

As a piece of detachable, tub-

bable neckwear the collarette has future possibilities which may be developed later, designers think, in sheer linen, chiffon and crepe, de Chine versions, with trimming of handwork or fine lace.

The varied uses of the scarf-collared are its chief recommendation. With the point in front, it drapes like a fichu. It has a v-shaped neckline and ruff effect when worn with the point in back. It can be draped and held in place with an ornament, or tied on the shoulder like a round collar with a bow fastening.

Small triangular cuffs, meant to be tied around the wrist, match the collarette when it is worn with long sleeved dresses. The sets are made from sheer materials, chiffon and valles the favorites.

## Walter Gifford Divorced Monday In Reno Courts

RENO, Nev., Aug. 6, (AP)—Walter S. Gifford, president of the American Telephone and Telegraph company, was divorced here yesterday by Mrs. Florence Pittman Gifford, who charged incurable insanity and declared that her husband's business interests came foremost in his life and that he had neglected his social duties.

The case was tried behind closed doors but the records were made available to newspapermen noted by Superior Judge George A. Bartlett, who presided.

Mrs. Gifford alleged that her husband's ideas of society differed widely from hers because he was too absorbed in his business. He became unkind to her and his home, married life apparently became distasteful to him, Mrs. Gifford alleged.

Judge Bartlett granted Mrs. Gifford the custody of the children, Walter and Richard, except that during the school period they shall be in custody of the father.

Mr. and Mrs. Gifford were married in Brooklyn in 1916.

NEW YORK, Aug. 6, (AP)—First public intimation of the marital troubles of Walter T. Gifford and his wife, who were divorced yesterday in Reno, Nev., came July 30 when it was learned Mrs. Gifford had established residence in Reno and Mr. Gifford admitted that a divorce was planned.

"I am sorry it had to happen so soon," Mr. Gifford was quoted at that time as saying. "I am sorry because on the first days of the boy's vacation they'll read about it. That'll hurt but it has to be known to them some day. I can't help it. But it's all so premature, I'm a bit startled at the speed of it."

Finke shot and killed Brown last May 2 in the corridor of a high school here as nearly one hundred students were pressing into the hall on their way to classes.
