The largest organization of its kind in the world, the Canadian Wheat Pool, is handling one-fifth of the world's wheat supply and is bringing prosperity to its 133,000 farmer-owners in Canada's wheat raising district. Last year this organization handled 222,508,000 bushels of wheat at a turnover of \$323,000,000. A typical country grain elevator, of which more than 1400 are functioning in Canada, is shown here. Farmers bring their grain to such elevators, from which it is shipped to huge central elevators. E. B. Ramsey, general manager of the pool, is shown in the insert.

## GRAF BEGINS ROUND WORLD TRIP TODAY

that a score of lightning bugs had been trapped in the web for sailors with flashlights were still crawling about the left rafters looking for other possible stowaways.

Once in the open commands followed in swift succession and despite one slight delay when a rope tangled and had to be straightened out the graf was in the air sixteen minutes after it cleared the hangar door.

**Heads up Coast.**—An hour later the minute it passed over Times square and so headed up the coast for New Foundland and the great circle route to Germany and its first stop on the world flight.

At Cape Race, N. E. Dr. Eckener expected to land his craft once more over the ocean that it had already crossed three times and will cross again after completion of the world flight less than a month after its takeoff.

From Friedrichshafen the course over the Siberian wastes to Tokyo where refueling will be fol-

lowed by a flight to Los Angeles across the Pacific and then, the fuel tanks once more replenished, the graf will cross the United States to the end of its long, long trail here and the realization of Dr. Eckener's years old dream.

The graf's passengers when she left this morning were a mixed crowd. There were two titled Brits, Lady Grace Drummond Hay and Sir George Hubert Wilkins, both acting as reporters; William B. Leeds, American millionaire husband of the former princess Ex-ona of Russia, who was just going along for the ride; Lieutenant John Richardson, official observer for the American navy; his superior Lieut. Commander Charles C. Rosenbatt, and various business men, reporters and photographers.
