Big Drug Store Chain Planned For Two States

SEATTLE, Aug. 8 (AP)—Planning the establishment of a drug store in every city of 4000 or more population in Washington and Oregon, an expansion program to cost several million dollars was announced today by F. T. Jamieson, head of the Jamieson Drug Store Inc.

Approximately 200 stores will be added to the company's present chain of 28, Jamieson said. Besides stores in Seattle, the concern operates establishments in Auburn, Tacoma, Olympia and Bremerton.

The concern will be handled under a stock sharing system, with the individual store operator allowed to hold up to 49 per cent of the stock in that store. In addition managers and minority owners will be allowed to acquire an unlimited amount of preferred stock in the holding company, Jamieson announced.

Jamieson has been in the drug business for 29 years, although he did not start a chain concern until 1923. R. B. Doane and Miss F. M. Dickinson are associated with him in the holding company. Doane has had drugstore experience in Spokane and La Grande, Ore.

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Corn, Tomatoes Lower Today In Oregon Market

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 8 (AP)—Corn and tomatoes hit the seasonal tohogran today at the East Side market of the Gardeners' and Ranchers' association. Corn dropped to \$1.40 for a sack of six dozen ears and tomatoes went to 40 cents a crate for second grades and 60 cents for first grades. Supplies of both are abundant.

Pears, with the season almost ended, reversed the order of things and went up one cent to 8. Raspberries are still struggling in at \$2.50, a slight increase, while loganberries are going at \$1.50. Blackberries are the same as the logans.

Apples were still coming in at 50 cents. Peaches may be purchased at \$1.25 a bag or 90 cents a box.

Other fruits and vegetables were unchanged.

Inaugurate Stock Trading On Ocean

NEW YORK, Aug. 7 (AP)—The Cunard liner Berengaria sailed for Southampton early today, inaugurating stock trading on the North Atlantic. M. J. Leachman & Co., in the first brokerage office to open for business on a trans-Atlantic liner, receiving quotations by radio. The firm has rented quarters on the Berengaria's promenade deck and arranged for offices on other ships. De Saint Phaulx & Co., also has arranged to open ocean going offices, and Hirsch Lillenthal & Co., and Henry Heintz & Co., are said to be planning such ventures.

DR. SNOOK WEEPS BEFORE JURORS

Snook said he wanted to leave but she refused. Tells of Quarrel

Then, he said, a quarrel arose over his intended visit to his mother's home at Lebanon.

"I told her I had some work to do for Mrs. Snook."

She replied "Damn Mrs. Snook, I am going to kill her and get her out of the way."

As he referred to his wife, Dr. Snook's voice broke and the tears flowed from his eyes. Dr. Snook testified that he struck the first blow to protect himself from an attack by the girl as they sat in his car parked on a lonely rifle range.

"The blow stopped her, he said, and she jumped from the car shouting 'damn you, I'll kill you, too.'"

Her purse was in her hand, and the defendant, fighting for his life from the witness chair, declared he thought she had a pistol in the purse and was waving the car to shoot him.

"I was sure she was going to shoot me. My only thought was to stop her. I sprang after her and struck her again."

"Dr. Snook at any time that night when you struck the first, second or third blow, did you intend to kill Theora Hix?" asked Soyfert, defense attorney.

"Heavens, no, she was a good friend of mine. I never thought she would do it."

Snook's Voice Breaks

As he answered the question, Dr. Snook's voice broke again. He pulled off his nose glasses and rested his head in his hand, while he wiped the tears from his eyes.

The voice was so low that attorneys on both sides asked for the reply to be read by the court reporter and no one knew what it was until the reporter's voice carried to the tense courtroom.

As the ex-professor sat shakily and trying to go on, Prosecutor John J. Chester Jr. suggested a recess which the court allowed.

The juror said he went home from the scene of the killing and that he slept that night.

Identifies Dress

He identified a blood stained dress Miss Hix wore the night of her death and claimed ownership of a knife. He said he found it on the floor of his car the morning after the killing.

General Advance In Stocks Today

NEW YORK, Aug. 8 (AP)—Speculative sentiment turned bullish in today's stock market on a combination of factors over the credit situation. Retention of the 5 1/2 per cent discount rate by the bank of England, and a lowering in call money from 8 to 7 per cent helped to revive confidence, which had been badly shaken by the drastic break in some of the public utility stocks earlier in the week.

There was a general advance in prices of favorite stocks in the final hour, with public utility shares responding to short covering. U. S. steel got above 22 1/2, while Aetna rose 12 points to a new high at 27 1/2. American Can moved up nearly 5 points. The close was strong. Total sales approximated 2,750,000 shares.

Wheat Irregular At Closing Today

CHICAGO, Aug. 8 (AP)—Wheat prices underwent sharp swings in the late dealings today, more than wiping out early advances in price but rallies were in progress at the finish. Reports of rains in Southern Argentina, together with increased Argentine shipments, led to much selling. The fact that the government crop report is due tomorrow also was a source of selling in some quarters.

Wheat closed irregular, ranging from 1/4 off to 1/2 up, compared with yesterday's finish. Corn closed at 1/2 net decline to 8 1/2¢ advance, oats showing 1/2¢ setback to 5¢ gain and provisions unchanged to 20 1/2¢ drop.
