PROGRAMS MAILED
TO ALL MEMBERS

Several Prominent Doctors of This State to be in Attendance, According to Secretary.

The program for the annual meeting of the Eastern Oregon District Medical Society, which is to be held at Wallowa Lake on Friday, Aug. 16, has been completed, according to Dr. Lewis Williams, of La Grande, secretary-treasurer of the organization.

In addition to the many well known medical men who will take part in the program, it is announced that Dr. Robert C. Coffey, of Portland, and Dr. Goodrich C. Schaffner, editor of the Medical Sentinel, of Portland, are expected to attend the wonderful convention. Dr. W. D. McNary, of the Eastern Oregon state hospital at Pendleton, and other prominent doctors in this section, are also expected to register.

Air Passengers
To Go Through
La Grande Soon

U. S. Aeronautics Official, in Portland, Tells of Plans for Route to Salt Lake.

Another announcement that a passenger airplane route will be established through La Grande was made yesterday in Portland, when Dillard Hamilton, inspector for the eighth district, aeronautics branch of the United States department of commerce, with headquarters in Oakland, explained three great aviation developments that will have Portland as the hub.

Mr. Hamilton said that a line of tri-motored machines flying up the Columbia river by lighted airways to Pasco and thence to a juncture with the transcontinental line at Salt Lake City was to be installed some time soon.

Although he did not announce the company, the statement recalls an announcement a few weeks ago in Pendleton by Nick Manner, of Spokane, to the effect that the Manner company planned to inaugurate passenger air service between Portland and Seattle and Salt Lake City, using tri-motored, all-metal cabin monoplanes.

Whether steps would be made in La Grande, Pendleton, Baker and other points between Pasco and Boise was not announced by Mr. Hamilton.

The route from Portland to Pasco, Boise and Salt Lake City, giving Portland passing passenger, mail and express service to New York, will be ready for opening, I feel certain, within the year, said Mr. Hamilton. "It would be easier, except for the difficulty of lighting through the mountains between Boise and Salt Lake City. Winter may catch them there."

ZEPPELIN IS
NEAR COAST
OF ENGLAND

Position Given as About 900 Miles West of Land's End.

REACH GERMANY
TOMORROW NIGHT

Friedrichshafen in Turmoil of Preparation for Brief Stay of Ship on Way to Tokyo.

HAMBURG, Germany, Aug. 9. (AP)—The Graf Zeppelin reported its position at 5 p. m., mid-European time (11 E. S. T.) as 42 degrees north latitude, 26 degrees west longitude. The message was received by the Hamburg American line.

The position given is about 900 miles west of Land's End, England.

LONDON, Aug. 9. (AP)—A message received at Croydon, London's airport, at 3 p. m. today (2 a. m. E. S. T.) stated that the dirigible Graf Zeppelin was approaching the English coast.

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany, Aug. 9. (AP)—This city today was in the midst of a turmoil of preparation for the brief stay of the Graf Zeppelin here before it leaves for Tokyo, on the second lap of its circumnavigation of the globe.

It was expected the dirigible would arrive here Saturday evening or Sunday morning, and would remain until Tuesday or Wednesday before taking off for the last, then 5,000 miles, which Dr. Eckener, the dirigible's master, has described as the hardest of the entire worldflight.

The Zeppelin works were the center of activity preparing gas, oil and supplies for the ship.

FIRE SITUATION SERIOUS TODAY. Two Big Fires Raging in Washington—California Homes Menaced.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 9. (AP)—Predictions of continued low humidity in the Pacific Northwest today added to the fears of forest officials supervising the battle against several terrific fires in national forest reserves.

Two fires on Cougar creek in the Rainier forest, Washington, after breaking away late yesterday, were reported gaining rapid headway today. The largest, at fire over 1,000 acres, slipped through the lines of weary fighters and today had spread into green timber.

A 20-man forest camp, equipment, trucks and food fell in its path.

The Midnight Mountain fire in the Chelan national forest in Washington was reported still out of control today. The condition of the Camas creek or Lake Chelan fire, where 10,000 acres have been burned over, remained unchanged.

There were no fires of consequence in Oregon.

FIRE MENACING HOMES. YREKA, Cal., Aug. 9. (AP)—Half a dozen ranchers in the Badger Mountain area prepared early this morning to vacate their homes as a forest fire swept down the mountain toward Hawkinsville, six miles from here.

Late last night the fires swept down the mountain.

Labor Day Hike To Start And Finish In La Grande—Distance 24.8 Miles. A route for the annual Labor day hike, the leading feature of La Grande's yearly celebration, was agreed upon at the meeting of the Central Labor council committee last night. The course, 24.8 miles in length, will start at 5 o'clock at the post office, go down Adams to the Island City highway and out to Island City, then north on the Sumnerville market road to the Iowa school house on the market road leading from Mt. Green highway, then back to La Grande, past Riverside park to Y avenue, west on Y to Second and across the viaduct to Adams, down Adams and out to Hot Lake road to the J. E. Reynolds corner, south to the football field and then follow the football field in past the graveyards, through Old Town to Fourth, down Fourth to the post office and then to the Omaha at Hendock and Adams.

With the course starting and finishing here and with the hike cutting back through the city about the halfway mark, more interest in the contest is expected to result. The finish of the hike will count.

Other events on the day's program include parade at 11 o'clock, sports and speaking at the high school athletic field, starting at 1:30 o'clock, stunt by fire department at Adams and Elm at 6 p. m., street dance 7:30 to 8:30, boxing match at 7:30, golf and jazz dancing in evening. At 8:30 o'clock in the morning a water carnival will be held at Crystal pier, with log rolling contests, diving and water races. At the high school field, besides the speaking, there will be races, stunts, climbing the greasy pole, ladies' club driving contest, and similar events.

It is hoped to be able to take motion pictures of the leading scenes in the celebration for local showing later.

At the meeting last night the coming picnic for organized labor, to be held at Indian Springs next Sunday, was discussed. It was said about 150 expect to attend from La Grande.

Wheat Crop For
Nation Is Lower
Than Last Year

Production Estimated at 773,885,000 Bushels—Condition of Spring Wheat 56.2.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9. (AP)—The Department of Agriculture announced today a corn crop of 2,740,614,000 bushels this year is indicated by August 1 conditions, compared with 2,662,000,000 last month and 2,836,000,000 produced last year.

The preliminary estimate of winter wheat production was placed at 568,233,000 bushels compared with 582,000,000 last month and 578,000,000 last year.

Indicated production of durum wheat (four states) was 49,253,000 bushels and of other spring wheat 156,850,000 bushels compared with 58,000,000 and 132,000,000 last month and 59,000,000 and 231,000,000 last year.

Lower Production. Production of all wheat was indicated as 773,885,000 bushels compared with 834,000,000 last month and 902,000,000 last year.

The August 1 condition of corn was 78.8 per cent of a normal, durum wheat 56.7 and other spring wheat 56.2.

Sentence Clarke To Eight Years In Federal Cell

NEW YORK, Aug. 9. (AP)—James Rae Clarke, senior partner in Clarke Brothers defunct private bank, was today sentenced to eight years in the federal prison in Atlanta on his plea of guilty to a federal indictment charging use of the mails to defraud.

A crowd of angry depositors, led by a middle-aged woman who screamed "you took my money!" chased Hudson Clarke Jr., one of the younger partners in the bank, through corridors of the federal building today and forced him to seek refuge in a corner of the post-office money order department.

EXPLOSION ON TANKER CAUSE OF ONE DEATH

NEW YORK, Aug. 9. (AP)—One man was killed and eleven injured in an explosion on the morning aboard the Standard Oil tanker William Rockefeller at anchor off Bayonne, N. J., the tanker, a flaming torch, was pushed by tug away from the oil docks and toward the lower bay in New York harbor.

The blast was felt in Staten Island, Lower Manhattan and all along the New Jersey waterfront. Burning oil was spread over the water.

PRICE BREAK.
DUE TO RATE,
HITS STREET

Scores of Issues Drop From \$5 to Nearly \$35 a Share Today.

MORNING RALLY IS BEATEN DOWN

Nose Dive in Stocks Due to Increase in New York Federal Reserve Rediscount Rate.

NEW YORK, Aug. 9. (AP)—A wide open break in prices, which carried scores of issues down \$5 to nearly \$35 a share was Wall Street's response to the unexpected increase from 5 to 6 per cent in the New York federal reserve rediscount rate. The market opened weak, rallied briskly before the end of the first hour, turned heavy again around mid-day, rebounded in the early afternoon and then succumbed to a renewal of selling pressure in the late trading, with final quotations in many cases around the lowest of the day. Total sales crossed the 5,000,000 share mark for the first time since last March.

After a collapse of prices, losses running from \$2 to \$26.50 a share, in a deluge of selling prompted by the increase in the Federal Reserve bank rediscount rate, strong support came into the market for a time during the forenoon, and many important issues rallied from \$3 to \$10 from their lowest levels of the morning.

Market Wavers Again. By noon however, the market began to waver, and price movements became highly irregular. U. S. steel, which had dropped about \$5 at the opening, and began to regain its lost ground decisively downward.

In the early afternoon, increasing its loss to more than \$6.50, American Can sold off \$9 and Westinghouse Manufacturing \$19. Trading slowed up somewhat from the furious pace set during the early transactions, when several blocks of \$200,000 shares of American Can and Westinghouse were sold.

Ticker was only 7 minutes behind the market, having fallen some 20 minutes in arrears previously. Trading during the first two hours was at the rate of 1,350,000 shares an hour.

DISCOVERY MAY IMPROVE HEALTH

Scientists Reveal Isolation of Long Sought and Powerful Hormone.

By Howard W. Blakeslee (Associated Press Science Editor) GOLD SPRINGS HARBOR, N. Y., Aug. 9. (AP)—Solution by scientists of a long sought and powerful hormone, that plays an important role in feminine health, was revealed today in an account of some new experiments at the biological laboratory of the Long Island Biological association.

This hormone is an internal gland secretion, the existence of which had been recognized for years as an essential principle of small bodies called corpora lutea. The experiments were described by Dr. Reginald G. Harris, director of the laboratory.

"Two extracts," he said, "both made from corpora lutea of animals have been discovered recently. The first was made by Dr. George W. Corner, head of the department of anatomy of the University of Rochester school of medicine and dentistry. The other extract was obtained by a slightly different method by Dr. J. J. Piffner, a permanent member of the laboratory staff.

Experiments on Rats, Rabbits. Dr. Corner's extract has been injected hypodermically into rats and rabbits, whose ovaries were removed after pregnancy. Ordinarily this operation would have meant death to the unborn young, but use of the extract resulted in normal birth of healthy young rats and rabbits.

"This result bears out a belief which many of us have held, that corpora lutea are essential for the carrying of the young," Dr. Harris said.

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SOVIET PLANE ENDS SECOND LEG OF TRIP

NOVOSIBIRSK, U. S. S. R., Aug. 9. (AP)—The Soviet airplane, "Land of the Soviets," landed here at 11:40 o'clock this morning after a three hour flight from Omsk. It was intended to reach Moscow today on the Moscow-Low trip but the machine was landed here for technical reasons.

Cup of Coffee Is Cause of Shooting

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 9. (AP)—For five cents a stranger shot and critically wounded George Engel, a lunch stand operator, last night. "Give me a cup of coffee," he demanded the stranger.

The proprietor reached for the cup to take it back. The stranger pulled a gun and fired, the bullet entering Engel's stomach. Hospital authorities said he has little chance of recovery.

AID FARMERS



Will Bar Prohibition Agent's Rifles In Some Areas

Doran Gives no Reason for Decision—Spectacular Gun Battle Occurs off Detroit.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9. (AP)—Prohibition Commissioner Doran, said today he was preparing to bar the use of rifles by prohibition agents in several communities. No change is contemplated, however, in sparsely settled districts where rifles are necessary for protection of the agents.

The commissioner said no general order would be issued but he would discuss the matter by correspondence with his administrators.

He declined to say what reasons prompted his decision. Doran said his decision still would permit agents to use their service revolvers in the densely populated communities.

In sparsely settled districts, especially in the mountains, the agents he added, needed rifles for protection. The situation in the Detroit area where one of the agents recently lost his life, he continued, was well in hand.

"We are better off there than we have ever been before," he said.

SPECTACULAR BATTLE. DETROIT, Aug. 9. (AP)—Coast guards and rum runners engaged in a spectacular pistol and revolver battle in the Detroit river early today with crafts of the rival forces racing down the middle of the river less than 100 feet apart. No casualties were reported although two of the guardsmen had narrow escapes. The rum runners escaped to Canada with their cargoes.

The federal forces were under command of Joseph T. Hagglove, chief boatswain's mate. Hagglove halted the three men in the speedboat, ordering them to halt. A volley of shots was his answer. Hagglove and the two coast guardsmen under his command emptied their pistols twice before the rum runners escaped toward the Canadian shore.

One of the rum runners, shots scorched Hagglove's neck slightly while another shot the uniform coat from one of the guardsmen's head.

(AP)—Creation of the largest banking house in the Pacific Northwest will be completed here Saturday if stockholders of 10 Seattle banks approve of a merger plan which will combine institutions with resources of nearly \$120,000,000. It was believed that capitalization of the new combination would be in excess of \$15,000,000.

The bank will be named the First National Bank of Seattle. National bank information from an authentic source indicated, and will absorb four major institutions and six subsidiaries. They are the Dexter Horton National, The Seattle National, The First National, the Metropolitan National, the University National, First Greenwood National, First Canal Bank, First Rainier Valley bank, First Security bank and the banks for savings.

Transcontinental Air Line Planned. MILWAUKEE, Aug. 9. (AP)—A new transcontinental air line having halifax, N. B., as its eastern terminal, and Vancouver, B. C., as the western is to be started soon. It was announced today by C. P. Herford of the Milwaukee association of commerce air service committee after a conference with Col. L. H. Britton, of Northwest Airways.

EAST OREGON
TO GET 1930
CONVENTION

Baker Practically Assured of Legion Meeting—No Others Bid.

LA GRANDE STUNT TIES FOR SECOND. Aviation, Care of Children, Hospitalization Discussed in Business Sessions.

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 9. (AP)—When Salem's \$30,000 municipal airport sponsored by the American Legion was dedicated Thursday afternoon, Governor Patterson, handicapped by diving and roaring planes, made one of the shortest speeches of his career. "I dedicate this municipal airport. Let 'er go," he shouted.

The American Legion stunt team from Bend took the first award of \$100, and the second prize of \$50 was split evenly between the La Grande and Baker teams, in the stunt contest, which was scheduled as a feature of the legion state convention today. However, no other places competed, the teams from Dallas, Sheridan, The Dalles and Hillsboro failing to show.

La Grande's Stunt. The Bend stunt, assisted by the entire drum corps and band of the legion, was a series of vaudeville acts under the direction of Jack Davis on the Hollywood airfield.

La Grande's stunt was a burlesque on the Four Horsemen, Pestilence, War, Famine and Death, dashing upon the stage riding stichorses in their wake was the pilot with street cleaning equipment.

The stunt offered by Baker was a drilling contest by the hard rock miners of the Baker post.

Adoption of the program outlined by the aeronautics committee of the state department will place Oregon first in the United States to have a definite established and marked airway system throughout the state, Secretary V. Hall, chairman of the aeronautics committee, reported to the eleventh annual convention of the American Legion this morning.

Urged to Mark Field. All posts are urged to see that fields are properly marked and the name of the city is painted on a building so as to be visible from an altitude of 2000 feet and that the emergency aeronautical committee of each post be made a permanent major committee.

Division of Oregon into six divisions or airways was recommended. Those outlined in the report included: Eastern Oregon route—La Grande, Baker, Trinneville, Union, Elgin, and Enterprise.
