## Valencia Bull On Rampage In Streets Today

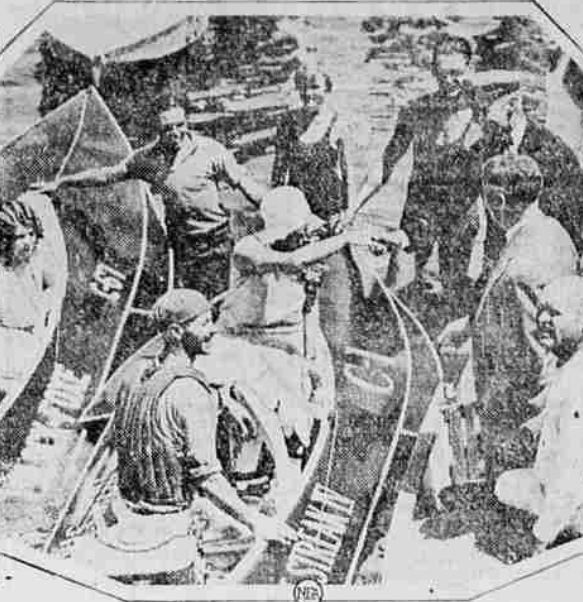
VALENCIA, Spain, Aug. 14 (AP)—A raging bull, intended for the Valencia arena, fought his way to freedom here today, killed one woman, wounded three horses, and frightened the populace. He finally was put in tow, however, and this evening awaited his turn against a matador.

The bull escaped while it was being taken to its pen, preparatory to a bull fight. It roared through the streets, with the populace scattering in every direction and entered the house of Vincente Porta.

Senora De Porta was in the kitchen busy with her work when the bull appeared in the room, knocking her down. It found its way to a rear door and entered the stable where three horses were eating. It butted the horses and returned to the street for more victims, after having made a complete search of the entire house.

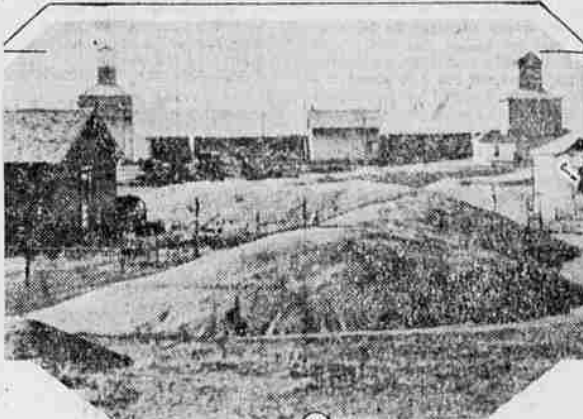
A crowd of onlookers regained the animal at a public thoroughfare and without much trouble soon had it in tow. Senora De Porta later was found in her kitchen, dead from injuries inflicted by the bull.

remaining frontiers where open ranges and open water holes prevail. Dakkers, the homesteader, and now the spokesman for his companions, questioned the legality of the justice court ruling, declaring that in effect it holds that the homesteaders have no property rights and that fences can be cut and trespass committed on any property.

But those not personally concerned in the quarrel see in it only a repetition of similar incidents throughout the old west when the range kings battled vainly against the influx of seekers at free government land.

## New York Society Girl "Broke" In Moscow After Exciting Adventures

MOSCOW, U.S.S.R., Aug. 14 (AP)—Miss Mary Van Henssler Cogswell, New York society girl, has arrived here temporarily penniless and in borrowed clothing after a series of adventures in which she tilted with European officialdom and red tape with the American abandon. With her was Mrs. Mabel Ingalls, also of New York, who had shared most of the adventures. The climax came when Miss Cogswell was thrown into a jail as a spy.

At the start of the recently concluded American tour of the Soviet union, Miss Cogswell gained a small niche in the hall of fame by being the first person ever to pass across the frontier of the union without a Russian visa. She had started without going through this formality rather than miss the tour and succeeded in wheeling entry out of border officials.

Barred from Mountain

Both women left the delegation at Tiflis, Georgia, and made their way into Armenia with the intention of becoming the first of their sex to climb Mount Ararat, a 7,000 foot peak that few men have succeeded in surmounting. They were saved their strength, however, by the flat refusal of both Turkish and Persian governments to permit them to try it.

They then attempted to make their way through the Caucasian mountains, in the main Caucasian range in southern Russia, on horseback but were arrested by the political police in Kutais for taking photographs without permission. They were detained two hours until the police established that they were members of the American party.

Their horses being exhausted after a 50-hour journey the women hired a motorbus for \$75 to take them to Vladikavaz. To offset this expense they picked up passengers on the way and collected \$55 in fares. Miss Cogswell acted as conductor and Mrs. Ingalls as chauffeur.

The only real tragedy of their odyssey came when they were journeying to Moscow on the regular railroad train from Vladikavaz. Miss Cogswell's passport, jewels and several hundred dollars in currency were stolen.
