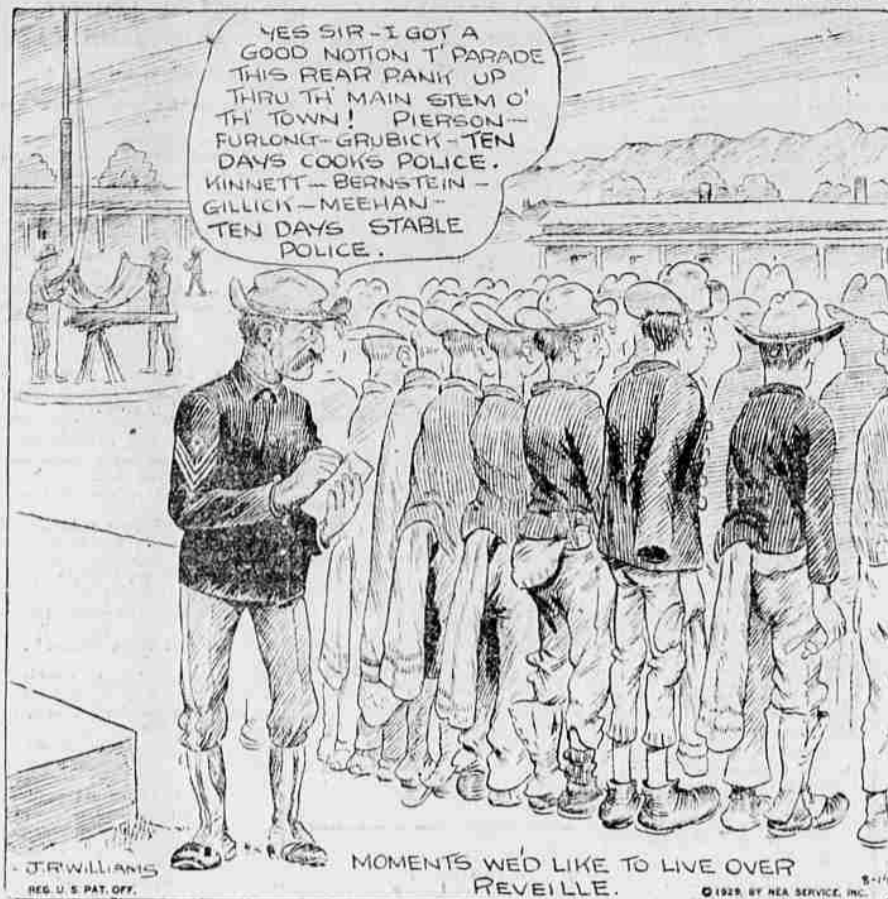

Witness Missing In Case Against Theater Owner

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 14, (AP)—William Jobelman, publicity agent for Alexander Pantages, and counted by the state as a star witness in the theatrical manager's preliminary hearing tomorrow on charges of attacking 17 year old Eunice Pringle, school girl dancer, was announced by District Attorney Byron Pitts tonight to have disappeared. Pitts said investigation of his office had searched all day for Jobelman, and had been unable to find him. The address he gave police when he made an informal statement shortly after the alleged attack on Miss Pringle in Pantages' private office last Friday, attaches of the district attorney's office said they had found to be fictitious.
Three other witnesses, as a result of Jobelman's disappearance, were taken from their homes to night and placed in custody of deputy sheriffs. They were W. C. Hale, W. L. Gordon, and Fred Ward, who Friday told police they heard Miss Pringle's screams and ran to the door of Pantages' private suite of offices in time to see the young woman stagger out.

Investigators of Pitts' office also were attempting to locate a young woman whom Miss Pringle accused of trying to push her back into Pantages' office when she was attempting to escape.
