Health Talks

Ready for School Campaign

A great many parents take advantage of determining accurately the physical condition of their children before sending them to school. These parents are to be congratulated for their foresight in having their children fit to enter school. If your child has not had a thorough physical examination, you do not know the condition of your greatest asset—the health of your child.

The attention of parents is called to the youngsters who are to begin school in September. At one time a visit to the outfitter for new suits, shoes and hats was thought all that was necessary. Now, the first thought should be the child physically and mentally fit to attend school?

Pre-school child health examinations are being held all over the United States. The purpose of these examinations is to discover conditions that need attention, that would handicap the child, or would make his susceptible to disease if left unremedied. The physician pays particular attention to the general health as indicated by weight, posture, heart and lungs, hearing and vision, throat and nose and teeth. When corrections are needed, the parents are urged to go to their family physician for advice and treatment.

You want your child to enter school well and strong. The progress of his school program is dependent chiefly upon his health. Physical defects make mental progress difficult. You doubtless know that diseased tonsils, decayed teeth, impaired vision and hearing will handicap the child in school. Three out of four children who enter school have considerable physical defects. It is important that your child have a good physical examination. Make an early appointment with your physician. Present

a copy of his report when the child enters school. Now is the time to get ready for school. In order that your child may enter school physically fit he should have a health examination. The Doctors of this state are co-operating in a plan to see that every child is in good physical condition.

This summer the way can be smoothed a little by attending to some necessary matters. Every child should be vaccinated against smallpox before he is sent to school. The administration of toxin-antitoxin is equally important and is becoming a routine in some counties. The physical handicaps of the child should be determined. All defects that can be remedied should be attended to before school opens.

Farm Pointers

Green feed for both the young poultry stock and the layers is essential during the warm summer weather, says the Oregon experiment station. If succulent green feed is not available, 5 per cent of a good grade of alfalfa may be mixed in the mash as a substitute.

White and ladino clover with blue grass and rye grass form the principal forage in sheep pastures at the Oregon experiment station, and has been found to have a high carrying capacity on irrigated land. Creeping Bent grass for low land with some sub-irrigation and Reeds Canary grass for marshy land subject to some surface water are also proving promising pasture plants at the station.

The time for culling the poultry flock is at hand, says the Oregon experiment station. Poor layers will stop laying in July and August, and it is advisable to remove them from the flock and market them.

A moist mash fed to the poultry flock at noon during the warm weather will stimulate the fowl's appetite and assist in maintaining production, says the Oregon experiment station.

Close adherence to grades and standards in marketing vegetables establishes a reliability of dealing between grower and buyer, says the Oregon experiment station. Uniformity of pack and grade of
