Coker to Speak At M. E. Church Sunday Morning

Former La Grande Pastor to Occupy Pulpit; Other Services for Day Announced.

The Rev. Mr. Coker, formerly pastor of the Central Church of Christ in La Grande, will bring the message in the First M. E. Church next Sunday morning. His subject will be "Isaiah's Vision Past, Present and Future." There are many who will be glad of an opportunity of hearing Mr. Coker again. Special music for the service is being arranged.

Eastern Oregon Young People's Meeting Closes

The Eastern Oregon young people's conference, which was held at the south of La Grande on the South Fork of the Willamette river, came to a close on Sunday afternoon Aug. 11. This marked the 25th closing of the sessions but about one half of those who had attended during the week stayed over for the complete on Sunday night.

The conference is an interdenominational meeting of the young people of Eastern Oregon for an intensive period of study and recreation under experienced and concentrated leadership. Classes in life, stewardship, young people's personal problems, Christian endeavor methods, primary class methods for Bible schools, and missions were held every morning. The afternoon was given over to recreation after a rest period which extended from the noon meal until 2:30 p. m. Competitive games of valley ball, indoor baseball, and various kinds of relays, basketball, some very exciting, and general discussion of the old "submarine" was not as popular as is commonly expected, but this seeming discrepancy was easily explained on the grounds of extreme coldness of the water.

The Rev. Van Noy's field representative of the board of education of the Presbyterian church as dean of the conference, had general oversight of all its activities in conjunction with committees elected by the conference members. The faculty consisted of the Rev. and Mrs. Scherer, of Parkville, the Rev. Mr. Carnahan, of Beaverton, Mrs. E. H. Hines, of Milton, and Ross Galloway, of Eugene.

At a general meeting of all the members of the conference, it was voted to hold a similar meeting next year at approximately the same time. All details however were left to be worked out by a special committee.

The great underlying purpose of the conference, as expressed by the leaders and by those attending, was to strengthen the spiritual life of the young people through deeper Christian experiences, and general discussion of the interdenominational viewpoint, in worthy of the support of all of Eastern Oregon.

First Church of Christ, Scientist
Services will be held Sunday at 11 o'clock at First Church of Christ, Scientist at First and Washington streets.

"Soul" will be the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, August 18.

The Golden Text will be: "I will rejoice the soul of thy servant; for unto thee, O Lord, do I lift up my soul." (Psalm 138:1)

Among the citations which will comprise the Lesson-Sermon will be the following from the Bible: "Happy is he that hath the God of Jacob for his help, whose hope is in the Lord his God" (Psalm 145:19)

A SEASONABLE RECIPE
Stuffed Pepper Surprises
Three green peppers,
Six small tomatoes,
One-half cup cracker crumbs,
One egg,
One-half cup of milk,
Two tablespoons grated cheese,
One-half teaspoon salt,
Pepper.

Select large peppers of even shape, cut in halves and remove seeds. Place a small peeled tomato in each half. Mix cracker crumbs with slightly beaten egg, milk and cheese. Add salt and pepper. Spread mixture over tomato, letting it fill the cavity of the pepper to top. Dot with shortening and place in individual muffins or muffin tins. Bake thirty minutes at 375 degrees F.

WILL DEPORT ALIENS TAKEN DURING RAIDS
HAMMOND, Ind., Aug. 15, (AP)—Deportation proceedings against unaturalized aliens arrested Tuesday night in wholesale raids by federal agents in East Chicago, Ind., were contemplated today, an federal authorities scanned the record of the 191 persons charged with specific offenses.

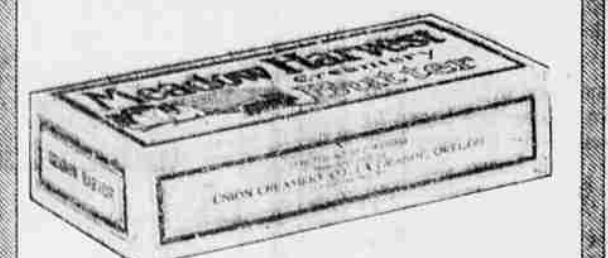
