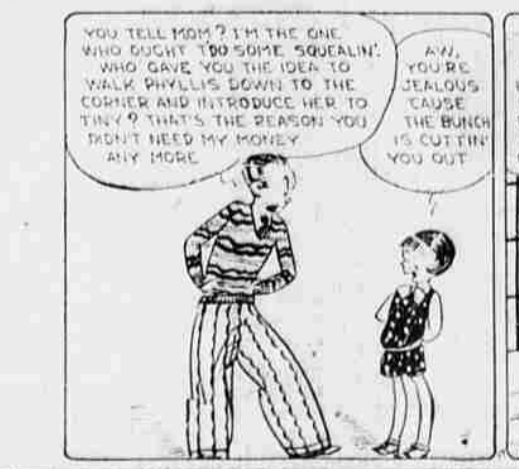

Sweet corn always is popular, as a vegetable and a boon to most housewives.

No matter how sweet corn is cooked, be sure not to over-cook it. For long cooking makes it tough and tasteless. Corn is one of those vegetables like peas which loses its natural sweetness very quickly after picking and should be cooked as soon as possible. Drop it into boiling, unsalted water and boil eight minutes. This length of time "sets" the milk in the kernels and makes the hulls just enough to make them tender. Long cooking is ruinous.

Corn Chowder is good for the first ninety days of autumn, but soon a bit hot for August weather. Sweetish is that time-honored combination of corn and beans our fore-mothers learned from the Indians.

Corn soufflé is delicate and ideal for hot weather.

Corn Soufflé
Six ears corn, 1-2 cup soft bread crumbs, 4 tablespoons butter, 1-2 cup milk, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon pepper, 2 yolks eggs, 3 whites of eggs.

Score rows of kernels, cut off tops and scrape with blunt edge of knife. Add butter, stir in bread crumbs and add milk. Cook, stirring constantly until thick and smooth. Add prepared corn, salt and pepper and cook three minutes longer. Beat yolks of eggs—fill thick and lemon colored. Add to corn mixture. Beat whites of eggs with a wire whisk until stiff and dry. Fold into first mixture and turn into a buttered baking dish. Bake 25 minutes in a moderate oven. Serve at once or the soufflé will fall.
