Health Talks

Gait Peculiarities Significant in Early Childhood

Within the limits of early childhood—the period between the establishment of walking and the sixth year—the child rarely stimulates or "puts on." Beyond the sixth year, self-consciousness or the desire for attention may prompt transient indulgence in limping or grotesque walking. Occasionally, of course, the younger child may do this, but too often the child with a serious physical defect has been neglected on the supposition that he is "copying Grandpa's rheumatic limp" or "Gimp's funny gait."

In this early period, a definite limp or apparent inequality of leg length calls for immediate investigation. A congenital dislocation of one hip is not difficult to recognize, at this time, and since the earlier replacement is accomplished the better the chances are for normal restoration, no mother should have her suspicions allayed by the assurance that her baby will "out-grow" the condition. Today relatively few communities are without X-ray service, and a fear proved unfounded is likely to be a great comfort to a handicapped child.

A side-to-side sway or waddly is usually present in the early weeks of walking, but its persistence beyond three or four months in an otherwise healthy child is never to be dismissed with the "fanny gait" or "getting over it in time." Again the X-ray and competent professional advice should be sought, for this waddly is characteristic of, and most commonly due to, dislocation of both hips.

The cause of congenital dislocation of the hip joints is not clearly known, but early treatment is fairly certain, and neglect is a disaster. As the child grows older, changes take place in the sockets and those parts of the thigh bones that normally fit within them, making a satisfactory replacement extremely difficult—sometimes impossible—and lead to disability, pain and unhappiness.

Gait peculiarities due to rickets may occasionally be confronted with the foregoing but the other cardinal signs are usually present in a square head, large joints, and either bow legs or knock-knees with flat feet. Modern medicine has made it possible to "outlaw" rickets in the extreme form, and probably most mothers know that direct sunshine, cod liver oil and orange juice prevent and cure this disease.

The various acute disease conditions affecting gait are usually of sufficient severity to call for medical aid early. Tuberculosis of the spine or vertebrae joints may be cited as an exception, since the onset at times is not accompanied by severe pain, and thus represents the only evidence that something is wrong. The child frequently thinks his trouble due to a fall or other injury, but careful in-

spection fails to show the usual evidence of injury that the parent actually can see, such as a sore toe, a bruise or cut.

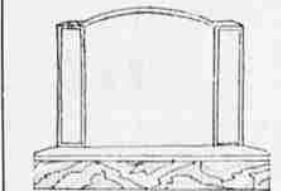
At times a condition so serious as bone abscess of osteomyelitis is considered to be rheumatism or just "fever," until destruction endangers life and limb. Children do not have rheumatism or rheumatic fever in one joint.

A mild attack of anterior poliomyelitis (infantile paralysis) occasionally leaves a mild limp as its only aftermath. The relation of the original illness is liable to be overlooked by the parents, and treatment neglected until the affected muscle, overstretched and fatigued by me, fails to make recovery, and deformity appears. Efficient treatment early might have resulted in more or less complete restoration.
