**MENUS**

Cantines and tourists always should keep in mind the need of pure drinking water.  
Contaminated water is even a greater menace than mill, and clearness and palatableness do not guarantee purity.  
Water which has been boiled for twenty minutes is sterilized and safe for drinking. But the intense heat of boiling drives out air and until air is again mixed with the water it will taste flat.  
Although nearly all roadstuffs, no matter how dry they may seem, contain some water, only about half the water required by the body is furnished in this manner.

**Functions of Water**  
Water regulates the temperature of the body, assists circulation, helps in elimination, aids digestion and thus the blood. These factors are essential for health and do their share toward keeping one cool on hot days.  
While water dilutes the digestive juices, these fluids work more efficiently when diluted so water with meals is a good practice. It should not be taken in large amounts to wash down half-manufactured food, but drink slowly after food has been completely chewed and swallowed. Water served with meals should not be too cold. Sudden chilling of the stomach retards digestion.  
Water used for dish washing should be pure. If after washing, all dishes and cooking utensils are rinsed in scalding water, the danger of contamination from this source is lessened.  
Heavy storms and rains may wash surface water into otherwise safe wells or reservoirs, making the water unsafe for the time being. At such times it's a wise precaution to boil the drinking water for the entire family for a few days.

It had been their plan to refuel at Halifax if their gas was low, but they had said that if the supply was sufficient they might decide to proceed to New York without landing.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Aug. 20, (AP)—The body of Miss Mayvel Crosson, San Diego flier reported missing last night when other entrants in the women's air derby from Santa Monica, Cal., to Cleveland landed here, was found early this morning six miles north of Wellton, Ariz.

**SUN GOD HEADS WEST**  
MILES CITY, Mont., Aug. 20, (AP)—The airplane Spokane Sun God, piloted by Nick Mamer and Art Walker, on an attempted trans-continental non-stop round trip flight, left here at 5:15 a. m. (mountain time) today, after refueling. The plane circled this city several hours early this morning, the delay being due to poor visibility caused by forest fires.

**AN RECORD ATTEMPT**  
SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 20, (AP)—Donald Tompkinson, former army aviator, trying for a solo refueling endurance record, took on a load of seventy gallons of gasoline at 5 o'clock this morning, completing the fourth refueling of his plane, the San Francisco. The refueling plane was piloted by Fred

McKinley, and also carried James Warner, and Phil Salzman at 5:10 a. m. the plane had been in the air continuously for 15 hours.  
In refueling, Tompkinson is spared the danger of leaving the controls unattended, by an automatic fueling device which catches the gasoline conduit as it is dropped. It is the first time the device has been used in endurance flights.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 20, (AP)—Charles W. (Speed) Holman, nationally famous flier, who posed on Nick Mamer in the New York to Spokane air derby two years ago, will be one of the seven entrants in the Portland-to-Cleveland cross country plane race, Floyd J. Logan, Cleveland, race chairman, announced today.  
Logan telegraphed the names of

entrants to Portland officials to-day and the six other pilots who will compete in the race which starts Friday here. Tex Rankin, Portland; Major Gilbert Eckerson, Springfield, Ore.; W. H. Emery Jr., Bradford, Pa.; Sydney Hall, St. Louis; Clarence F. Bates, Milwaukee, Wis.; T. A. Wells, Wichita, Kan., and Earl Wright, San Francisco.  
Contestants began arriving at Swan Island airport here today.
