Navy Dirigible Back In Hangar After Long Trip

LAKEHURST, N. J., Aug. 21 (AP)—The United States navy dirigible Los Angeles returned to its hangar today after a ten and a half hour flight over Central New Jersey.

While in flight the dirigible practiced picking up and releasing an airplane. The plane, piloted by Lieutenant A. W. Gordon of the navy was caught by a wire hung from the stern of the Los Angeles, which consisted with a hook on top of the plane.

Flying at the same speed as that of the Los Angeles the pilot brought his plane into position under the stern of the great airship and swung the hook on his wing into the U shaped wire attachment. The propeller of the plane was continued in motion to prevent the tail from dropping. This difficulty will be surmounted by attaching another hook to the tail of the plane and another yoke further back on the dirigible. It was explained.

After flying together for several minutes the plane was cut loose from the airship as the pilot drew the hook from the yoke and swung his craft toward the ground. The test was made in accordance with Lieutenant-Commander Herbert V. Wiley's project to develop the scheme until as many as six planes can be carried at one time. He recently announced his intention of taking the Los Angeles up at every opportunity to make more experiments.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21 (AP)—The launching of an airplane from the dirigible Los Angeles while the latter was in flight last night and the former's successful return was set today by the navy department to be the first time that the feat had been accomplished at night. Lieutenant A. W. Gordon piloted the plane. He succeeded with the experiment in three of four attempts.

STOCK MARKET TURNS HEAVY AT THE CLOSE

NEW YORK, Aug. 21 (AP)—The stock market, having experienced an almost perpendicular advance since the drastic break of August 9, showed signs of tiring today under the steadily expanding stream of profit taking and short selling. It succeeded in whirling up about a dozen high priced industrial and specialties including U. S. Steel common, Union Carbide, Westinghouse Electric and

Bethlehem Steel, to new high records, but other recent favorites lost ground, giving the market an irregular appearance.

Coppers showed signs of strength in the early afternoon under the leadership of Anaconda, which crossed 122. The market turned heavy in the last hour, with renewed selling of the public utility and related issues. General Electric and American Telephone each lost more than 4 points. Powerful bullish operations in the motors failed to reverse the trend. General Motors was sent up more than 4 points on sales of more than 100,000 shares, and Du Pont, which holds a 20 per cent interest in the corporation, rose nearly 8. The close was heavy. Total sales approximated 4,800,000 shares.

SAVED FROM DEATH

PENDLETON, Ore., Aug. 21, (AP)—Melvin Hahlon, gas company employe, was saved from death by James Tuesday by John Adams, a fellow employe, while they were engaged in cleaning gas mains.

Today Adams entered the same manhole and was overcome by fumes again. He was quickly revived.
