

### PORTLAND WINS SERIES OPENER

#### Frisco Shoved out of First Place by Fullerton's Three-Hit Game.

The Los Angeles Angels forged ahead to the Pacific Coast league lead yesterday, as the three top pitchers of the day before were beaten in series openers.

Smashing out four hits in the ninth inning, the Angels won from Seattle in the northern city 7 to 6. It was a pitchers' duel between Smith and Burchett until the last frame, with four hits for each side, when the Indian hurler was ousted out of the box.

**Ducks Swamp Frisco**  
The Portland Ducks, behind the brilliant pitching of Curt Fullerton, triumphed over San Francisco in the rose city 3 to 1. The Portland pitcher, held the visitors to three scattered hits, one of them a homer by Smead Jolley. Jolley however, was blamed for some loose fielding which held back the Seals. The Portland hurler added to his laurels by making two hits in the same number of trips to plate.

A seventh inning batting spree gave the Oakland A's an 8 to 3 victory over the Hollywood Stars at Los Angeles. Lefty Johns, star Hollywood hurler, was pounded from the box in that inning.

**Senators Trim Missions**  
Sacramento's Senators triumphed over the San Francisco Mission Reds by an 8 to 6 score at Recreation park here. A three run rally in the ninth inning gave the Senators sufficient margin to nose out the locals who made two errors in their half of the last frame.

### Yankees Defeat Faber; Chicago Cubs Break Even

The two major league races have developed almost identical situations with the Philadelphia Athletics 12 games in front of their nearest American league opposition and the Chicago Cubs nine and one-half games to the good in the National circuit.

Although the Cubs got no better than an even break with the New York Giants they increased their lead by half a game as the Pittsburgh Pirates took another on the chin from the Phils.

Both Cubs-Giant games were pitchers' battles. Freddy Fitzsimmons outpitched Guy Bush in the opener and the Giants won by 4 to 1. In the nightcap, however, Hal Carlson blanked the Giants with six hits and the Cubs won 1-0.

**Bush The Victim**  
Bush, losing his third game of the season as against 17 victories was the victim of some poor fielding by McMillan and English. Fitzsimmons, however, would have had a shutout himself had not Bill Terry dropped an easy throw in the ninth.

Carl Hubbel gave Carlson a great argument in the second game, a triple by Hornsby and Wilson's single giving the Cubs the only run of the game in the fourth.

The Phils outpitched the Pirates for the third time in a row by an 8-6 count. Lou Koupal pitched great ball until the seventh when the visitors scored two runs, three of them on Paul Waner's homer.

Thanks to another brilliant pitching performance by Ray Moss, the Brooklyn Dodgers got an even break in two games with the St. Louis Cardinals. After two Wilbur Sherdel had outpitched Dizzy Vance to give the Cards the first game, 3-2, Moss blanked the red birds with four hits and walked off with a 4-0 triumph. It was Moss' fourth successive win.

Red Lucas pitched the Cincinnati Reds to an easy 6-2 victory over Boston to record his 14th win of the season.

**Yankees Gain**  
In the American league the Yankees picked up a game on the Athletics by beating Chicago, 5-4, while the A's were losing to St. Louis, 2-1.

Ralph Kress' homer with one on in the sixth decided a tight pitchers' battle between Alvin Crowder of the Browns, and George Earnshaw and Jack Quinn of the A's at St. Louis. Crowder permitted only four hits.

**Julianus Reuten**  
Barker was knocked out of the box in the first inning by Cleveland but Myles Thomas stopped the Indians dead thereafter and Washington walked away with a 6-2 verdict.

The rampaging Boston Red Sox assaulted three Detroit pitchers for 15 hits and beat the Tigers, 12-8. Charlie Beffing went the route for Boston although he was nipped for 13 hits. He sided his own cause with a double and two singles, drove in one run and scored two.

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## Sport Slants

You see his name rarely in the box scores any more, but Eddie Collins, king-pin of second basemen when the Old Athletics were winning world's championships, is a vital cog in the New A's. As staff aide to General Connie Mack, Collins takes over a good deal of the detail work. Brought up from his college days in the Mack school of thought, Eddie is a keen strategist himself, a quick-thinker with the same intuition that Ty Cobb possessed for doing the right thing.

Now that Cobb has retired, Collins, in his twenty-second consecutive year in the majors, has the longest continuous service record of any player still in uniform.

Recently I asked Collins the secret of Mack's ability to maintain on him a group of baseballers swift-moving affairs after so long a term as manager and at an age when most elderly gentlemen prefer ease or golf to directing an exciting ball game from a hard, hot bench.

"You know, it never ceases to amaze me—the real enthusiasm that Mr. Mack retains," replied Eddie. "Of course he has forgotten more about the game than most of us will ever know, yet he retains the memory of everything essential. The style of play has changed but Mr. Mack has kept up with it. I have never seen anyone so consistently keen in sizing up situations and plays, so able in handling a variety of players, many of them temperamental—it is almost uncanny to me.

"The club this year is working its head off for one man—Connie Mack. Of course we all like to be with a winner but to a man the A's think more of winning this pennant for Mr. Mack than they do for any extra money or glory they may get out of it."

Like many veterans, Eddie Collins regrets the way the free-hitting era of baseball has ruined most of the old "inside stuff."

"I don't say we were any smarter in the old days but the game of 15 to 20 years ago certainly put more premium on fast-thinking and quick action than nowadays," he remarked. "A big flock of runs now can knock the best prepared piece of strategy all over the field. I think the reason for a lot of the hitting is the lack of confidence among many pitchers after they have been battered up. You know, pitching is 50 per cent confidence, anyway, with around 30 per cent for ability and 20 per cent for the 'bricks.' Hitting is just about the same."
