More Hard Luck Dogs Williams' Test of Racer

ANNAPOLIS, Md., Aug. 22 (AP)—With the odds to the misfortune which have dogged his attempts to get his tiny mercury racer into the air being reached yesterday on his third futile attempt of the day, when he was unconscious for five minutes in the cockpit of the craft travelling nearly 100 miles an hour, Lieutenant Alford Williams is ready to try again today.

Williams was forced to abandon efforts yesterday when the terrific speed at which he was travelling forced the pure air from the small compartment which he practically has to lie down in to man the ship, and gases from the 24 cylinder motor forced their way in and overcame him.

The navy's air speed ace said that when he felt dizziness overcoming him, he almost automatically cut the switches on the motor, and the little torpedo like seaplane came to a halt, and he was aided from the cockpit.
