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PORTLAND WINS TENTH STRAIGHT

Ducks Nick Seals 7 to 2 While Seattle Trims Los Angeles Club.

The second defeat for San Francisco in this week's series with the Portland Ducks in the northern city enabled the Los Angeles Angels to retain a half game lead over the Pacific Coast league club yesterday. The Los Angeles club was beaten by the Seattle Indians in the Redskins' camp. Portland by its victory forced into third place to tie with the Hollywood Stars.

The Ducks scored their tenth consecutive victory by winning from the Seals. The score was 7 to 2. The Seals nicked Ray Chester's field for two runs in the first when Coleman closed a homer with a runner on base. Each team bagged ten hits.

Cubs Increase Lead to Ten And One-Half Games

Just by way of reporting that they were not disappointed at the temporary loss of Charley Grimm, the Cubs slipped three Giant pitchers for 11 blows at the Polo Grounds yesterday to win 9 to 2 as the Giants submitted to their daily suffering by the Yankee Philistine. The net result of these proceedings was to increase the margin of Mr. McGraw's team in its annual baseball games, a 104 against seven with the regular first baseman missing a fractured left leg.

Physicians and surgeons announced that Grimm's fracture, even though on his throwing arm, might not keep the regular first baseman out for more than three or four weeks.

Cubs For Tolson
Disparagingly named Senator Clarence Blair the Little Rock crowd in temporary absence of first base, but dispatched a hurry call for Charlie Tolson, who has been in Los Angeles by the Cubs and staying.

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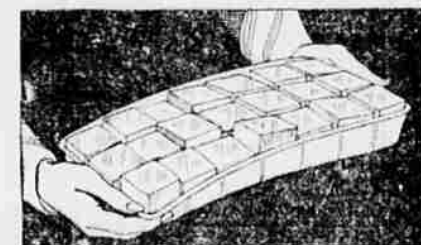

Sport Slants

Like most other marks in this fast-moving era of sport, the half-mile running record likely will fall under the flying feet of some new Mercury but the two men most venerable of knocking it off quickly, Douglas G. A. Lowe of England and Lloyd Hahn of Nebraska, apparently have hung up their spiked shoes for good.

In 1908 a dozen years for Ted Meredith's old record of 1:52.1-5 to be lowered to 1:51.3-7 by the sailing German, Otto Peltzer. Hahn ran the "530" in 1:51.2-5 on a hundred indoor track a year and a half ago but unfortunately indoor performances have no official standing in the blue-book of international records.

Lowe seemed capable of a similar record last summer. He made a show of Hahn, as well as Peltzer at Amsterdam in the Olympic 500-meter trials, setting a new record. Shortly afterward, at Rainford Bridge, on a terraplat

but afternoon and after one hard race, Lowe reeled off his half-mile lot of a relay in close to 1:50. He had the aid of a running start but he wasn't extended. Had he been given the chance for an official try that day, it seemed Lowe might easily have cut two seconds off the record.

There have been few greater competitors or more graceful strikers than black-haired Douglas Lowe of Oxford. He likes to run "for the sport of it," but he prefers now to concentrate on the more serious business of becoming an English barrister while Hahn turns to farming.

Relief pitchers seldom make good starting pitchers. Some time ago I asked Hucky Harris the reason for this. Hucky handled one of the best relief men of them all, Frazz Marberry, who helped Washington win pennants in 1924 and 1925.

"There must be something psychological about it or else it is like the fellows who prefer attending to other people's troubles than to their own," said Hucky. "Marberry always acted to me as though he didn't feel at ease unless he was in there with the bases unlined, not one out and the ball game at stake. Put him in there at the start of a game and he usually would feel an immense he would fill the bases. The trouble was he didn't solve his own troubles as well as those some other pitcher let him."

The Brooklyn ditch-digger Ferguson who took only 29 putts for an 18-hole round in the national public links golf championship tournament at St. Louis with the starting total of 10 one-putt greens, set a record for title play in any kind of competition. There's nothing even remotely resembling such a feat in the record books.

In the last American open, Greenwood took only 11 putts for a one-hole stretch, including seven one-putt greens, but Gene Gooden 27 for the round. Normally, putting is just half of any golf battle, with champions at their best averaging around 24 to 25 putts per round.

44 Mermaids Are Ready For Lake Ontario Swim

TORONTO, Aug. 22 (AP)—Forty-four mermaids stand ready today for the ten-mile swimming marathon of the exhibition here—swim in Lake Ontario tomorrow afternoon. This number passed the physical test yesterday when physicians examined 44 entrants. The only woman to fail was Ima Lett of Memphis.

Ima Lett had entered the lists with her mother, Mrs. C. N. Lett. The daughter's blood pressure was found to be 104, and physicians said this would prevent her from swimming in cold water. Mrs. Lett said she might give up the race because of her daughter's inability to compete, but at the last report she had not withdrawn her name.

Officials plan to give a special examination today to prospective competitors unable to present themselves yesterday.

Most of the swimmers have been training lightly this week, and will taper off with limbering exercises in the water today. Among the notable entries are Ethel Herle and Martha Norblin of New York, Dotis Deroyed and Olive Gatterdam of Toronto, Ruth Towens of Denver, Dorothy Widmer of Seattle and Della Sullivan of Haysake, Mass.

After inspecting the course yesterday, veteran competitors said they expected the water to be much warmer than the spotted 58 degrees. If it is colder than this the swim will not be held.
