The Ducks were still second in the standings, however, with Los Angeles holding a half game lead.

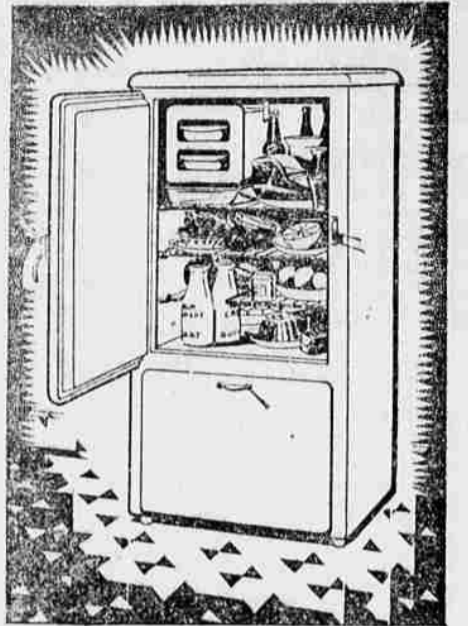
