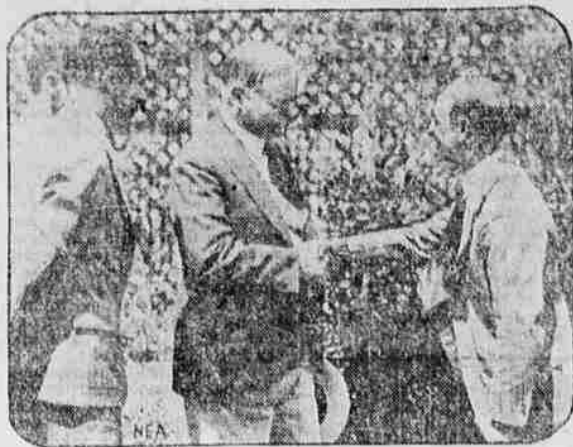
## Quiet Wedding In Walla Walla

## MENUS

By Sister Mary

One of the cleverest ways to use up small pieces of leftover meats is in sandwiches. These hearty sandwiches served with tea or milk make an ideal summer luncheon for porch or garden.

If the knife is sharp, the butter softened to spread and the bread not too fresh, sandwich making is not a chore and the sandwiches are neat and appetizing. Choose a broad bladed case knife for spreading both the butter and filling.

Thin vegetables such as carrots, celery or tomatoes, if the sandwiches are to be used at once combine well with meats and add to the wholesomeness of the sandwich. Shredded lettuce, cress, curly endive and

parsley add a piquant touch, and furnish mineral content as well as vitamins. After washing and thoroughly drying them, any of the vegetables or "greens" can be quickly prepared by running through the food chopper with the meat.

## With Bits of Meat

These sandwiches are suggested for use when the bits of meat are so small and broken that they can't possibly be served in slices. The corners that break off during carving and the meat close to the bone of a roast or steak can be trimmed and utilized.

Crisp heated bacon combined with curly endive seasoned with paprika and lemon juice uses up the slices left from breakfast in a palatable sandwich.

Cold roast beef combined with raw carrot, minced parsley and a drop of onion juice well seasoned with salt and pepper makes a tasty and nourishing sandwich.

## A Tasty Combination

Cold roast lamb combined with watercress and mint is an excellent combination. Lemon juice or cider vinegar is used to make the mixture moist. Tender mustard leaves are good to use if cress is not at hand.

All bits of fat or gristle should

be carefully removed before meat is chopped for the fillings. Three or four tablespoons of a chopped meat combined with the same amount of chopped or grated vegetable will make several sandwiches.

Mayonnaise can also be used to bind the filling but lemon juice is more desirable when the sandwiches are made for children.

## Martha Norelius Takes Lead In Ontario Swim

TORONTO, Aug. 22, (AP)—Martha Norelius, former world amateur champion, glided swiftly into the lead as 45 women distance swimmers dove from the starting line at 12:15 p. m. today in the annual ten mile Wigley marathon in Lake Ontario. Ethel Hertle, defending champion, followed her by a few yards in the chase for the \$15,000 prize money.

At the crack of the starting gun, the 45 contestants flashed away from the float in one line but Miss Norelius, Olympic champion and holder of a dozen world records, quickly pulled into a lead of several yards over Miss Hertle at 100 yards.

Most of the contestants paraded to the float in tight bathing suits and heavy coats of grease. Several discarded the suits just before the start.

Miss Norelius held a lead of ten yards over Ruth C. Tower, of Toronto at the end of the first mile. Mrs. Evelyn Armstrong of Detroit was third and Miss Hertle fourth, 75 to 100 yards behind the leader. Leah Hiley, of Keansburg, N. J., was fifth. The two pace setters were stroking 58 and 46 strokes to the minute respectively.

Officials announced at the start that the temperature of the water was 64 degrees. The weather was warm with a light breeze from the southwest and a slight haze over the three mile course.
