Color Scheme Hints

Possibilities in carrying out a color scheme, even to the intricate layers of a shrimp canape and a pudding—and achieving truly appetizing and tasty results—were developed throughout the pretty luncheon that the home economist prepared as she discussed it.

There should be no disturbing shades—no doubtful pinks—she cautioned, when a color scheme is worked out. And it is an error in cooking etiquette ever to duplicate a flavor, even in order to achieve a blending color, she emphasized.

Eastern fashions in culinary fields are forecasting the omission of butter in the so-called luncheon, she explained in introducing a rich crisp, that had its butter "baked in."
