ZEP STARTS FLIGHT OVER THE PACIFIC

(Continued from Page 1)

...who arrived here from Friedrichshafen, with tickets reading to Lakeland, three new passengers were aboard, Lieutenant Commander Itsumasa Kusaka of the Japanese naval general staff; Ichi Shiro, Japanese news agency representative; and Major Shinichi Shibata, of the general staff of the army. They replaced four others who left the ship here after the trip from Friedrichshafen.

570-Mile Course

Ahead of the Graf by a course of some 570 miles which Dr. Eckener expected to cover in close to two hours, a schedule which, if adhered to, would bring the Zeppelin to Los Angeles at 2:15 a. m., Pacific time, Tuesday.

It was widely possible the Zeppelin would exceed this and arrive at Los Angeles in the cool of sundown Monday evening.

The course, broadly speaking, lay northward from here to south of the Aleutian Islands, where the turn southward toward Seattle, Wash., would be made. From Seattle it was planned to cruise southward along the Pacific coast to Los Angeles. Dr. Eckener made it plain, however, he would vary his itinerary according to the weather conditions he encountered.

From Los Angeles Dr. Eckener planned to fly 2,500 miles to Lakeland, N. J., completing the round the world trip he began there Wednesday night Aug. 7, at 10:40 p. m.

10,000 Watch Departure

It was understood Dr. Eckener's decision to leave when he did was occasioned by reports of typhoons in the southern seas. Once he was over the Pacific the Graf's master radioed Premier Hamaguchi thanking him for Japanese hospitality, and to the air base commander praising the zeal and skill of the base personnel, whom he exonerated of any blame in Thursday's accident.

There was promise of mild tailwinds for the first part of the transpacific trip. If they should last, Dr. Eckener believed, he might make Los Angeles within 50 hours, or by about 8 a. m., Pacific time (9 a. m. E.S.T.) Monday, appearing over Seattle Sunday evening.

Wheat Price Is 3 Cents Higher At Close Today

CHICAGO, Aug. 22 (AP)—Sudden broadening out of European demand for wheat from the United States gave an immediate boost to wheat values today, with highest prices toward the end. Helping lift the wheat market were adverse crop reports from Argentina, and Australia, with semi-official figures today indicating recent estimates of the 1929 wheat yield in France were much too high. All advices today from Canada continued to suggest a wheat crop far below that of last year.

Wheat closed unsettled 2 1/2 to 2 3/4 above yesterday's finish. Corn closed 1/2 to 1 1/4 up; oats 1/2 to 3/4 advance and provisions unchanged to a rise of 1/2c.

There is no question that a victory of the Philadelphia Athletics in the American League pennant race this year would be popular with the customers. And the general impression might be gained that it would be a popular victory with the other clubs in the league who had been convinced that they couldn't win.

Some of the Yankee players have complained that they were getting all the beating down in the league. They didn't try to give the impression that the other clubs were diving to the A's and working on them. But they did say that the opposing clubs saved their best pitchers to knock them off and that some of the opposing clubs didn't have their best pitchers ready when time came to work on the A's.

The Dough Angle Enters

But it has been learned from conversations with the ball players on the other clubs that the Athletics will not send them into rhapsodies if they win the pennant. There is a financial reason. The clubs that finish second and third will not get as much of a split of the world series money if it is played in Philadelphia. If the Cubs and the Yankees were to play part of the series in the Yank Stadium there might be a new record prize for the players who share in the receipts.

Other Angles Also

There is another reason also for the cool feeling that the other ball clubs have toward the Athletics. This was brought out in a convincing way a few days ago by the manager of an American League club who seldom has been known to make any kind of a critical remark about another ball club or ball players on other clubs.

"The Athletics," he said, "are giving us all a pain. Their heads are puffed up how so much they're
