Homer Barrage Wins For Cubs; A's, Yanks Lose

The Cubs approached the end of their final eastern invasion yesterday by blasting another victory from the Phillies, this time with an artistic home run barrage in the park which really gave birth to the modern four-base epidemic. Hank Wilson's thirty-third, with two on in the sixth; Rogers Hornsby's twenty-eighth, with one on in the seventh; and Zach Taylor's first, with the bases empty in the eighth, enabled the Cubs to win by 4 to 1—and incidentally add half a game to their lead, in case anyone still feels it necessary to measure the margin of the clan McCarthy.

In tie for leadership Wilson's drive not only smashed a scoreless tie and gave the Cubs their ultimate winning edge, but also lifted the stocky Chicago outfielder into a tie with Babe Ruth and Chuck Klein for the inter-league home run leadership.

Mob Smith hurled the Braves to a 5 to 2 victory over the Cardinals at Boston yesterday, despite a home run by his pitching rival, Jess Haines, pitcher in the box offed against, and the Giants and the Red Sox pounded old Jack Quinn just hard enough to win by 3 to 1. The A's were shut out until the ninth.

In losing to the Browns by 5 to 0 at St. Louis, the Yankees created a record for the season.

George Blahodler allowed only three hits and two runs when two infield scratches swelled the bugman's total to five. Herb Pennock was the victim of a bad break in the fourth when the only error either side committed, a wide throw by Lazzari, paved the way for four unearned runs. He would have lost anyhow, of course, on the one earned marker.

DUCKS CLIMB TO SECOND POSITION

Angels Continue to Hold Lead in Coast League But by Slim Margin. River.

The blocky Los Angeles Angels, who fought their way to the top of the Pacific Coast league through a maze of difficulties in the second half of the 1929 season, clung desperately to a half game lead over the rest of the pack today.

However, the other clubs, clear down to the Mission Reds of San Francisco were close on the heels of the best-footed, hard-hitting Angels. The Hollywood Stars and the Portland Ducks were fighting in a tie for second place, and only half a game behind them stood the San Francisco Seals, with the team straggling half a game back.

Los Angeles won from the Seattle Indians yesterday on the latter's home grounds by a 2 to 1 score. Walsh allowed the Indians to bunch three hits for one tally in the second inning, but blanked the Redskins from then on in a game replete with thrills. Walsh stopped threatened rallies in both the eighth and ninth when the Seattle team nearly tied the score.

The Portland Ducks made it twelve straight wins by dawning San Francisco 3 to 2. Wallace Walters, whose regular post is at third base, hurled for Portland while Jack Knight, ex-Duck man, held his former team mates to two runs until the fifth when an explosive rally outlasting in Walters' double brought in five more.

San Francisco's Mission Reds made it another triumph over the Sacramento Senators at Recreation park. The score was 5 to 1. Sherlock hit a home run to help the Reds win the game.

Hollywood, by dint of heavy hitting attack, won from the Oakland Aces at Los Angeles, 7 to 5. Oakland led up to the eighth inning when the score was 5 to 4 in its favor. Henry Seversal, and Sheelback flogged the horsehide for homers almost immediately after the Oaks had turned in a trio of circuit clouts.

Jack Believes Max Schmeling Made Big Mistake

CHICAGO, Aug. 24 (AP)—Jack Dempsey believes Max Schmeling, his German double, has made a serious mistake—one that may prove extremely costly to his future in the boxing game—by returning to Germany before having got his troubles in the United States.

"I think Schmeling should have stayed here until he cleared up his difficulty with the New York commission and his managerial troubles," Dempsey said. "He should keep on fighting, too, for he will lose ground in remaining idly very long."

Schmeling has just started and he needs plenty of fights if he hopes to win the championship, the former champion asserted. Dempsey today named Ray C. Alvia, a Chicago fight manager, as matchmaker for his promotional activities at the coliseum. In so doing he complied with regulations of the state boxing commission which provides that the matchmaker be bona fide residents of the state.

Dempsey's first fight card in Chicago will be October 2.

NAVY AVIATOR KILLED TODAY NEAR EUGENE

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 24 (AP)—J. J. Denschoek, naval aviator of San Diego, Cal., was killed here this morning when the plane in which he was on route from Seattle, Wash., to San Diego nose-dived from a height of 300 feet and crashed up.

Lieutenant Richards, of the Eugene air port, said Denschoek arrived in Eugene last night from Seattle and took off from the field in a perfect takeoff heading southward.

TILDEN DEFEATS LOTT

NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 24 (AP)—William T. "Big Bill" Tilden, defeated George M.
