Transcontinental Train For Oregon

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 25. (AP)—Paul J. Shoup, president of the Southern Pacific railroad, who arrived in Portland yesterday with a group of other prominent rail officials, said today that with the opening of the Alamosa-Klamath Falls cutoff, Oregon would be served by another transcontinental passenger train.

Shoup said the service would be all Pullman and would be enlarged as conditions warranted.

The 25 mile cutoff connects with the Nevada, California and Oregon railroad at Alamosa and provides a shortened outlet through the Oyster gateway by means of the Southern Pacific's overland route, he said.

HOOVER BACK AT HIS DESK THIS MORNING

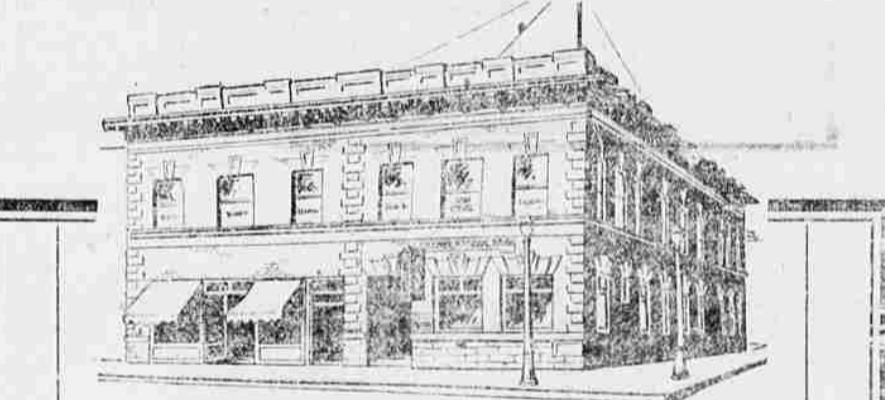
WASHINGTON, Aug. 26. (AP)—President Hoover returned to the white house at 10:15 a. m., today from a weekend at his camp on the Rapidan river in Virginia. The chief executive was accompanied by Mrs. Hoover and the guests he had with him over the weekend. Allan Hoover, the younger of the two sons of the president and Mrs. Hoover, remained at the camp, where he is recuperating from a stomach ailment.

The presidential party left the camp at 7 a. m., and made a rapid trip to Washington, completing the 110 miles in three hours and fifteen minutes.

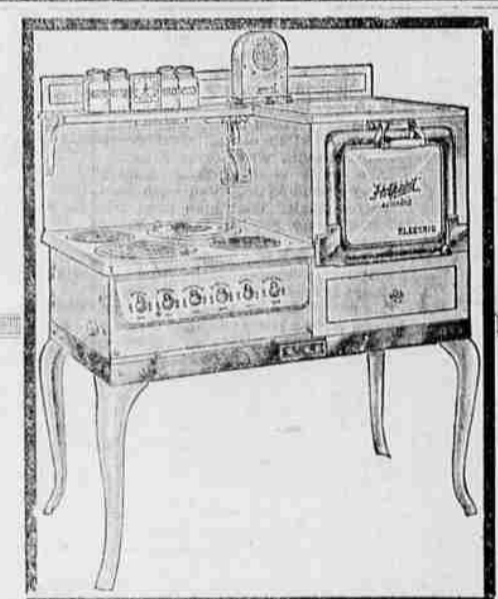
