ed a dispatch from Paul Knabenshue, American consul at Jerusalem, giving what he described as a complete list of American citizens whose deaths in Jerusalem had been verified.

The spelling and first names of the dead in many instances differed from that received from other sources. Department officials were unable to say which list was correct but it was said the differences might have resulted from mistakes in transmission or at the source.

The report listed the dead as follows: Zevy (Walter) Herman, Philadelphia; David Shubert, Noma.

the second across Russia and Siberia to Kasumisaara, Japan; and the third across the Pacific to Los Angeles.

Whether the sky ship would pay a visit to the national air races in Cleveland, Ohio, tomorrow was dependent upon the meteorological situation for it was the intention of Dr. Eckener to circle Cleveland if weather conditions permit.

Under any circumstances, it is believed the dirigible will reach its goal in Lakehurst, N. J., sometime

during tomorrow night for it was the expectation of the navigators to achieve the transport from Los Angeles to Lakehurst within 48 hours. That will complete the first circumnavigation of the earth by a lighter than air craft.

scattered parts of this end of the county it would appear that the average yield of fall wheat for this season here will run between 20 and 25 bushels per acre.

The spring sown grain has been hard hit on the greater part of the dry lands and very low yields are being received in many instances. Parts of the fields suffered so much from the drying weather that the grain did not head in many parts of the fields. Cutting

of the spring crops on the irrigated farms in the valley has been in progress during the past week and some exceptionally fine fields of grain are to be seen. A little threshing has started in parts of the valley and it is expected that cutting will be far enough along to allow several of the stationary outfits to get into operation on the valley crops during the next week or ten days. With plenty of machines and help more plentiful the remaining portions of the crops will be taken care of rapidly if the weather continues good for another week or two.



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
