

COLUMBIA RIVER PROJECT IS NEXT

Development of Mighty Stream Will be Asked Next December.

SEATTLE, Wash. (AP)—With the Boulder dam project out of the way, congress will be asked next December to undertake an even greater task—the development of the mighty Columbia river.

The project would include the development of at least 2,250,000 horsepower of hydro-electric power, the reclamation of 2,000,000 acres in the Columbia basin of eastern Washington, and the construction of locks that would make possible the navigation of the Columbia river from the Pacific ocean to the Canadian border, a distance of 746 miles.

As the first step, the Columbia River Development league, representing many Washington cities and towns, will ask for the construction of a power dam at Grand Coulee in central Washington and the gradual reclamation of the Columbia basin project.

A dam 226 feet high would produce 1,250,000 horsepower for sale and 1,000,000 horsepower for pumping water for irrigation. A dam 350 feet high would enable production of 2,000,000 horsepower for sale and 1,000,000 horsepower for pumping purposes.

The size of the dam would depend on the report of the United States army engineers under Maj. John S. Butler, who have been planning for the development of the river. These plans call for a series of power dams and locks which would open the river for navigation to the border.

From the international line to the sea the river drops 1,350 feet. Estimates place the total electric energy possible for development at 12,000,000 horsepower. The sale of this power would be expected to pay for the entire improvement program.

The league will ask congress to pass a bill similar to the Boulder canyon measure. No work would be started until a market for power was assured. Bonds on the land and contracts for power would protect the United States for funds advanced.

The pumping project is one of two methods suggested for the reclamation of the Columbia basin. A gravity system has been proposed and backed by many. Advocates of the Grand Coulee dam believe that the power project will pay for the reclamation and would be more readily accepted by congress. The cost of the 350-foot dam and power plant and the reclamation of 2,000,000 acres is placed at \$135,000,000 by the league.

Their plan, however, when secretary of commerce said that the Columbia river should be developed at the earliest possible moment and that the sale and lease of water and power would pay for the entire project. The president also has predicted that improvement of the river would double the population of Washington.

Farm Pointers

The latter part of August or September is the best time to cull the ewe flock, believes the Oregon experiment station.

Animals that are deep-bodied, thrifty, wide-muzzled, and with good heart birth are usually the best producers, giving plenty of milk to raise strong, vigorous lambs, and producing a good crop of wool. Age, condition of the udder, removal of contamination of the animal, and uniformity in the flock are all considered by the experienced sheep raiser in deciding which animals to winter and which to replace.

Late summer spraying for peach blight, one of the two worst diseases of peaches, is necessary as soon as the crop is off the trees, says the Oregon experiment station.

To protect the orchard against this blight, or to insure against its further spread if already present, it is essential that this late summer spray be applied before the fall rains begin. To get complete control, experienced growers find that thorough application, covering every twig and bud, is necessary. Bordeaux mixture, either the 4-4-50 or the 6-6-50 strength, is used.

The silverfish or fish moth, an insect pest of the scales with which the fish is covered, is a troublesome pest to landings, libraries and museums in Oregon, feeding upon starched and dried bindings of books, labels and other things fastened with paste or glue. Control recommended by the Oregon experiment station consists of sprinkling powdered sodium fluoride, borax or pyrethrum in its hands, or by the use of a poison bait made of 1 pint of flour mixed with 1/2 ounce white arsenic, with enough water to make a thin paste. This is placed on tins or cards and placed out of reach of children or house pets.

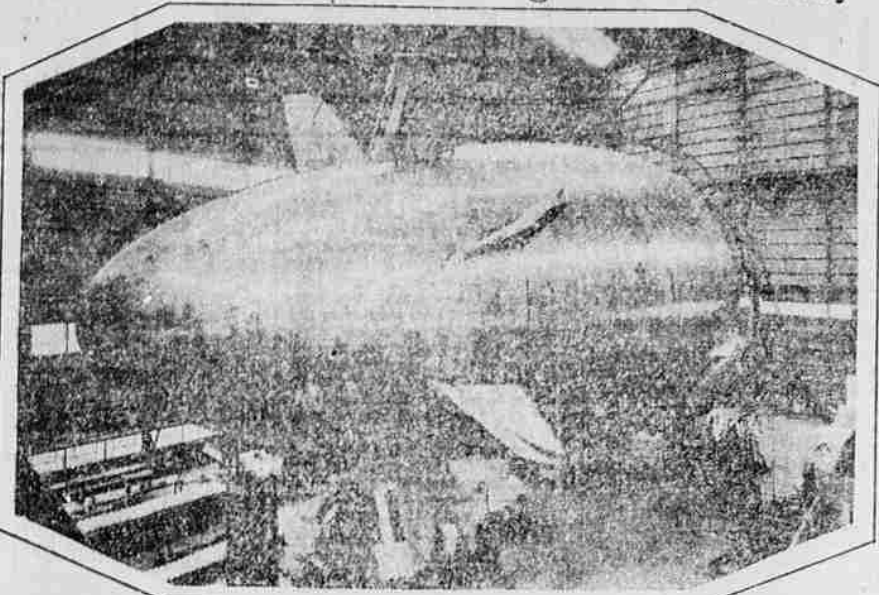

Navy's First All-Metal Dirigible Soon Ready



Here's the ZMC-2, the first all-metal dirigible built for the United States navy at Detroit and soon to be delivered. The huge fins above and below the cigar-like body control the craft and embody new principles in dirigible operation. The dirigible is 150 feet long and 50 feet in diameter and is inflated with helium gas. It will carry a crew of four and a load of 1000 pounds over 1200 miles at a cruising speed of 55 miles an hour. The weight is approximately the same as that of a fabric-covered dirigible as the welded metal envelope is very thin and fewer braces are required. Below is the control car.



Kentucky's Criminals Impressed By Lesson of Two Condemned Men

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP)—Once a week the silent men and women expiating their crimes against society in Kentucky penal institutions bear a practical lesson in the folly of law violation.

In every penal institution and jail in the state they hear the story of two men who transgressed the law against murder and soon will die in the electric chair at the state prison September 11.

It is not because of any interest in the brutal crimes but execution of a method conceived by Governor Sampson to impress law violators through concrete evidence, that crime does not pay.

It is his proclamation, read to the prisoners each week through a high the story of the two convicted murderers is unfolded and will be repeated until the two men die in the electric chair at the state prison September 11.

In his proclamation, the governor says: "May this lesson be deeply engraven upon the hearts and minds of the criminals inclined, that they may not forget it. Virtue must be regarded for its priceless worth. It is deplorable that men living in the greatest country should violate the rules of society and make it necessary to pay the

extreme penalty and die an ignominious death on the gallows or in the electric chair. Respect for, and obedience to all laws is essential to peace, prosperity and happiness. The rules of society must be observed, the laws of our land must be obeyed. The citizens who are criminally inclined must learn to respect both the rules of society and our laws."

Carl Bord, one of the condemned, killed Mayor A. George, a Louisville merchant in a robbery December 12, 1928. Charles Mith of St. Louis, an accomplice, already has been executed.

Ivan Hutsell, the other man awaiting execution was convicted at Lawrence of the slaying May 19, 1927, of Mrs. John Dittler. He killed the woman and her husband in revenge because the former aided his conviction in an Indiana case which caused his imprisonment.

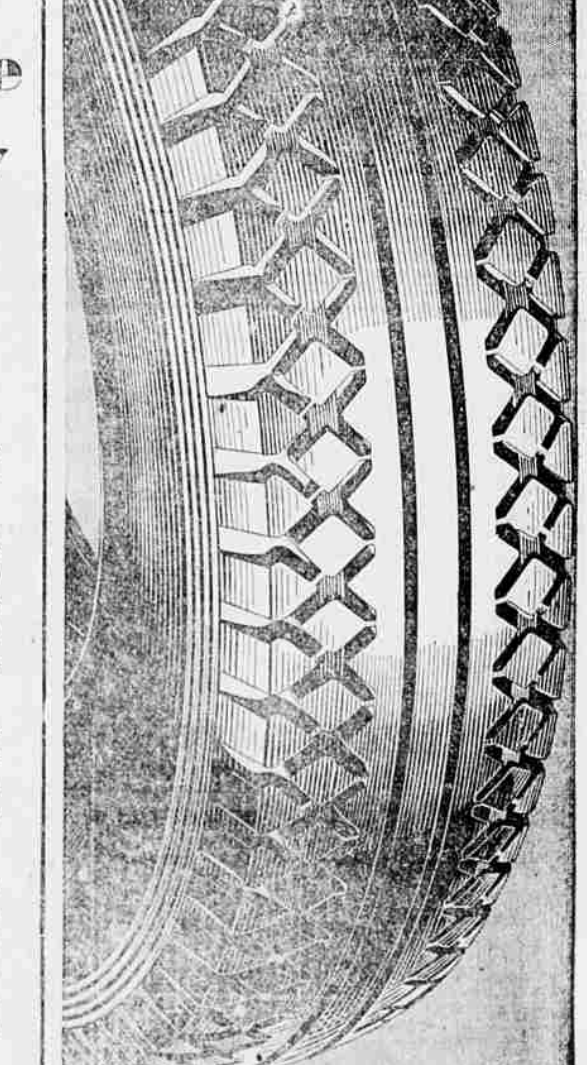
