helped on a near lawn, according to reports. Across the street another laborer who was mending a truck was knocked to the pavement. Other than being stunned, no one was injured. The lightning followed the wire until it reached a transformer on a light pole demolishing the transformer.

Dr. Frederick A. Cook Edits Prison Paper In Walled Journalism School

LEAVENWORTH, Kas. (AP)—Frederick A. Cook, erstwhile doctor, explorer and author, is testing the pen's mightiness behind prison walls.

A school of journalism for the training of prisoners, the first of its kind, has been established at the United States penitentiary here by its warden, T. B. White. Dr. Cook, who is serving a 14-year sentence on a charge of using the mails to defraud, is editor of this school's monthly publication, "The New Era."

Dr. Cook has penned a "bill of rights" for the prison's latest branch of vocational training. In an editorial the man who claimed to have discovered the north pole in 1908 contends that the prison's journalistic school is to reawaken the sleeping mentality of 2,500 men—the penitentiary's population.

This analysis of public affairs, as viewed from a prison, includes these statements:

"A prison school of journalism is new, so new that the announcement will come to most educators as a questionable experiment. The press is not independent, as is often claimed — no news service ever can be — because it is planted at the crossroads of the world where all is interdependent. Human betterment is all that a jail paper has to offer. The type of special training which a prison school of journalism can give must resolve itself into a system of adult education, a salvaging of lost schooling."

"Crime is not due to a lack of education, but to an incapacity to foresee the consequences of every act. The warden has this in mind when he seeks to industrialize all prison activities in a trade school. Success in this new endeavor depends upon willing cooperation, and cooperation is the passport to the wealth of America's economic empire."

MENUS

There are many delicious ways to put up grapes for winter use. Whether the California grapes with their rich solid pulp or the Eastern, juicy varieties are used, the result is appetizing. The Tokay preserves of California are closely rivalled by the Concord conserve of Ohio.

If grape jelly is wanted, grapes that are not quite ripe should be chosen. Ripe grapes have lost their jelly-making content and should be used for preserves or bottled juice.

Grape conserve is particularly good with rolls during the winter months.

Spiced grapes have a tartness that may appeal to those who like a tang with their meat.

10 pounds sugar, 1 pound seedless raisins, 2 oranges, 1 cup chopped nut meats.

Wash grapes and separate pulp and skins. Cook separately. Put pulp through a strainer to remove seeds. Add pulp to skins with sugar raisins, juice of oranges and the rinds of two cut in shreds. Bring to the boiling point and cook 15 minutes. Add nuts and cook 5 or 10 minutes longer. Pour into sterilized jelly glasses and cover with paraffin when cold.

Spiced Grapes
Five pounds grapes, 3 pounds light brown sugar, 1 tablespoon ground cinnamon, 2 teaspoons all-spice, 1 teaspoon cloves, 1 cup cider vinegar.

Wash and pulp grapes. Cook skins until tender. Cook pulp and remove seeds. Add strained pulp to skins with sugar, spices and vinegar. Bring to the boiling point and boil five minutes after mixture is bubbling all over. Pour into sterilized cans and seal while hot.
