Health Talks

TWO FACTORS PRODUCE MOUTH IRRITATION

No race, civilized or barbarian, seems to be immune to cancer in certain regions of the body, when there is continuous chronic irritation. The relation of chronic irritation and cancer in man and animals has been established. One race in Africa that has acquired the habit of chewing betel nuts suffers more from cancer of the mouth than all the other races together that do not use it. Another primitive race keeps warm in winter by carrying hot coals resting on the skin of the abdomen. In the home that is produced, cancer usually develops. The likelihood of cancer starting in an unhealed wound after a burn has been known since the beginning of recorded medicine.

In the mouth there are two factors that can produce the irritation, tobacco and sugar. Dirty teeth. My studies show that the greatest danger of cancer is present when there are both factors. When the teeth are not kept absolutely clean and smooth, tobacco must be discontinued in all forms. The moment there is a sign of sensitization of irritation, or the moment a white spot, leukoplakia is observed. Smokers should ask their dentists to examine their teeth for sharp edges, and to look at the mucous membrane in every part and recess of the mouth, especially on those parts of the cheek and tongue that come in contact with the teeth. If leukoplakia or any other irritation is found, tobacco should cease, because the patient is sensitized, and the danger of cancer is begun.

Every dentist should also look for Vincent's angina, because this is responsible for many sore spots in the mouth that have no relation to tobacco or teeth, and, as far as I know, no relation to cancer. The infection of Vincent's angina produces a sore mouth known during the war as "trench mouth," and it has become very common in civil life since the war.

Cancer of the mucous membrane of the mouth in which you can exclude tobacco and sugar, teeth or some definite form of injury, is rare. Cancer of the mouth is rare in women because as yet they are not unusually heavy users of tobacco and they keep their teeth clean. Statistical studies from England show that the incidence of cancer of the mouth in users of tobacco in occupations that directly limit the hours in which they can chew or smoke is very less than the incidence of cancer in users of tobacco in occupations that do not so limit their indulgence.

Clean mouths and clean teeth are fortunately becoming a more universal habit among civilized people, but even today the medical profession increases to diagnose and relieve many diseases by using betel to look at the mouth and to take X-ray films of the teeth.

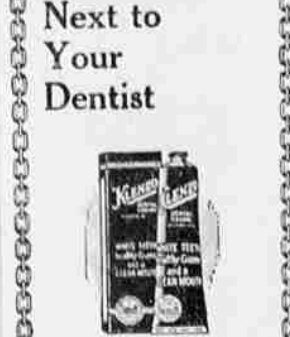

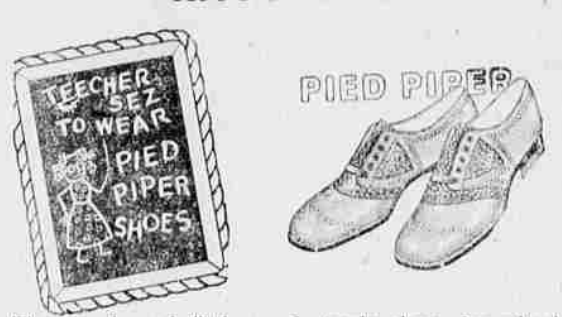

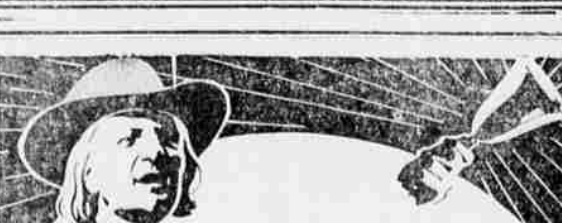
