SHIP WRECK DEATH LIST MAY BE 74

It suddenly plunged. The whirlpool threw the life-boat in the air, and we all fell in the ocean. I started swimming and looked for the woman and child, but could find no trace of them.

"One person floated close to me, and I made a grab for the body, but it sank. Swimming around there, I could hear the last screams of the terror-stricken people as they were pulled down in the vortex of the whirlpool created by the sinking ship."

Waste was finally picked up by a life-boat, and arriving at the emergency hospital here, was found to have several cracked ribs and possible internal injuries.

Heads Sacrifice

A story of an heroic sacrifice of a brother's life for his sister, was told by Miss Rose Hulfa, a practicing attorney of Mexico City. Her brother, who told officers, shortly after the crash, clasped his life-boat around her.

Miss Hulfa, with injuries which physicians say may possibly prove fatal, today mourned the loss of her brother, who went down with the ship.

Alex Cowie a survivor brought to port by the cutter, Shawnee, said he had lost his false teeth in the excitement. He paid \$120 for them just before sailing, he told officers.

As the doomed San Juan dove, it carried Cowie with it. He was pulled down, and then blown high in the air as the boilers burst, and with the sudden rise which probably saved his life, away went his prized teeth.

Clifford T. Paulson, 22, chief radio operator of the San Juan, told how he stuck to his transmitter, sending distress calls, until the water swirled up about him.

"A second later the water was over my head," he said. "Then I tried to fight my way to the door. The radio room was completely flooded and I was trapped. Finally I pulled myself to the door and grabbed the top. In this manner I was able to pull myself out. Once I was free from the room I rose to the surface like a cork."

Robert Winston, 18, of Los Angeles, walked into the San Francisco offices of the company operating the San Juan and demanded a refund of the cost of his ticket. That was his first act after stepping ashore from the Dold, which picked him up.

Only two bottles had been recovered up to this morning. The coast guard cutter Shawnee located the bodies of three women, unidentified except for the initials "J.L.M." on a ring on the hand of one.

"They were shouting, crying, calling for life preservers," said George H. Houghton, Los Angeles business man. "Some were praying. Someone was swearing. There must have been lots of persons in the water, because I could hear many screams. Then it became deadly still. A thousand things ran through my mind. I must have lived an eternity in six or seven minutes. It reminded me of Dante's 'inferno'."

Perhaps the most extraordinary rescue was that of six-year-old child, Hollis Pifer. When the crash came his mother, Mrs. Marguerite Pifer of Los Angeles ran out on deck, carrying him. She saw the big bow of the oil tanker buried in the side of the San Juan. She tossed her son up to the deck of the tanker and then went down with the San Juan. Little Hollis rode safely into San Francisco on the tanker.

First offenders will be confined in a separate prison in California now under construction.
