

One Man Taken From Mine; Five Others Trapped

STOCKTON, Cal., Sept. 5 (AP)—Somewhere in the depths of the California copper mine at Copperopolis today five miners were entrapped under a hundred tons of rock and dirt that slid upon them yesterday in a thunderous cataclysm that is thought to have crushed the life out of at least four. The fifth man, one Monday, a Mexican, was believed still alive early today. Numerous efforts to dig out the men, who were trapped in a tunnel, were made today and were in a last-minute stage.

The men were trapped at the 150-foot level of the mine while ascending the shaft. Two miners, one of whom was named Monday, were rescued and taken to the surface in a hoist, escaped the cavern and given an alarm. Off-shift workers scurried to the rescue of the trapped men until 2:30 p.m. when the mine digging to rescue them, by an hour, was brought to the surface, crushed and mangled, but still alive.

It was discovered yesterday that the flood gates at the reservoir on which the village depends for its water supply had been thrown open, draining the entire supply.

Youth Is Missing From Companions

MEDFORD, Ore., Sept. 5 (AP)—A searching party was today pressing through the Red Bluff district near Medford in quest of some trace of John Wright, 22, missing since last Tuesday afternoon when he disappeared from a fishing party.

His fishing rod was found along the banks of the Upper Rogue river and searchers said marks indicated that he had slipped and fallen into the stream.

Harold L. Lynam, wealthy bank director of Boston. Mark M. Campbell, Cincinnati, was taken aboard by the Richardson Paper company.

A reward of \$500 was offered by the Transcontinental Air Transport company today "for any man or group of men who find the missing plane of the T. A. T. The reward does not extend to the plane but to the crew."

McDONALD CONFIDENT
GENEVA, Sept. 5 (AP)—The tremendous desire for peace shared by 95 percent of all the peoples of the world will enable President Hoover and the British prime minister to solve the moral power problem, said Ramsey MacDonald, speaking today at a luncheon given by the council of the league of nations by the International Association of Journalists, accredited to the league.

Amid applause the British labor leader said: "This spirit of peace will support the hands of President Hoover and myself and enable us to settle the question of statesmen."

He added his conviction that no considerations of national interests would dominate them or cause them to risk failure.

"We have our difficulties to be sure, there are things intricate in character to be settled, but the will of the people is more powerful than all else and in the end it must have the last word," said MacDonald.

admit a student to college. College entrance requirements vary considerably so it is not easy to give a set amount of such subject that a student will need. English, languages, science, mathematics and history are the groups required by most colleges. It is important that students understand this clearly.

Courses Offered
Courses offered in the high

school include: general scientific, commercial, college preparatory, language and industrial arts. These courses include the various subjects offered. Physical training is required of all students. Music, with credit arranged, includes boys' glee club, girls' glee club, hand, orchestra and chorus, with piano, voice and violin out of school.

Graduation requirements consist of 15 units, with 16 preferred. Students in all courses are required to present for graduation the following: English, 3 units; American history and civics, 1 unit; and science, 1 unit.

General requirements for students include a deposit of \$1 for a locker and lock to cover breakfast (any left over will be refunded); a deposit of \$2.50 for manual art students; possibly a small deposit in physics and chemistry, carrying of four full-time subjects and acquaintance with provisions leading to H-144 honors and to four-year honors.

The school board, which has charge of all school in district No. 1, which includes La Grande, is made up of George S. Birmo, chairman; Colon R. Eberhart, P. A. Epling, J. L. Eagle and W. C. Perkins. H. E. Williams is clerk.
