MENUS

By Sister Mary
A plain soufle is quite nourishing and yet not too heavy for hot noon. Served with a creamed vegetable, it makes an excellent main dish for luncheon.

The soufle is not as heavy as a noodle or macaroni ring but is a better source of protein and brings a vegetable meal into satisfactory balance.

A luncheon in which the soufle with a creamed vegetable forms the main course would be well rounded out if enriching with brown stinging cream bread and stuffed baked apples were served. Do not attempt to remove the apples from the dish in which it was baked for serving. The vegetable in its sauce may be served in a separate dish and the soufle served from the baking dish.

Creamed celery, lima beans, cauliflower or onion peppers are reasonable vegetable to serve with a plain soufle.

Plain Soufle
Two tablespoons butter, 2-tablespoons flour, 1 cup milk, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon pepper, 7 eggs.

Melt butter, stir in flour, and when bubbling and perfectly blended slowly add milk, stirring constantly. Add salt and pepper and cook until perfect smooth. Remove from fire and beat in yolk of eggs, one at a time. Fold in whites of eggs beaten until stiff and dry on a plate with a wire whisk. Turn into a well buttered baking dish and place in a pan of hot water, cover with hot water, and bake 30 minutes in a moderate oven. When firm to the touch the soufle is done. Serve at once.

NEW YORK, Sept. 6 (AP)—Search was under way today for a man representing himself as C. E. Waggoner, Georgia banker, to explain a mysterious \$200,000 transaction in which six large New York banks were victims of fake telegraphic money transfer orders.

Two Billion Dollars Annual Cost Of Preventable Illness, Is Estimate

This city, in common with the rest of industrial America, is absorbing its proportionate share of \$2,000,000,000 a year in preventable illness. Premature deaths cost another \$4,000,000,000 in economic losses.

Deaths striking progress made in checking some diseases in the last decade, the earning power of every person in the United States is reduced an average of almost \$20 a year through ill health.

Some facts were made public by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. Through them the chamber hoped to call attention of business men and manufacturers to the enormous toll sickness and preventable death exact from the nation's earnings power.

The final price industries pay for sickness has never been determined, the chamber declared. Only estimates may be presented, based upon records obtained from varied sources.

One manufacturer with an annual payroll approximating \$5,000,000 estimated illness among his employees cost \$257,000 annually. This includes charges for idle machinery and reduced production.

The loss to the individuals and the community due to illness of his employees is placed at \$200,000 a year, taking into consideration direct loss of wages, lowered earning capacity during convalescence, medical expenses and charitable relief.

In the business world a representative group of stores, the chamber said, showed that illness and injury cost each employe an average of six days a year.

For a working force of 1,000 persons, earning an average of \$2 daily, this totals up to \$3,000 a year in direct wage loss alone.

The chamber pointed out that increasing progress has been made in checking disease. The future promises even greater strides

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 6 (AP)—Because an agreement has been reached between union and public service corporation officials in New York, the city returned to normalcy today after a two-month car strike.

Announcement of the agreement was reflected favorably by the city street cars which have operated on regular schedules with only meagre patronage, being immediately loaded.

Flowers are stressed in the judging of lawns in order to be in keeping with the aim of the flower show.
